

The Daily Market Report

PORTLAND, May 6.—That flour prices will have to be raised still another notch is quite generally the opinion of millmen and jobbers, but when the next advance will come as yet is a matter of uncertainty. In the wholesale grocery trade there has for a week been persistent talk of another boost, and though the trade at present prices is hardly on a satisfactory basis, with practically nothing doing in an export way, it is inevitable that flour must follow the course of wheat, and that cereal in the markets of the world shows an upward rather than a downward trend.

Since the advance to \$6.05 on patents, which took place on April 15, the flour trade has been none too active. Dealers have been inclined to take on only the supplies they actually need from time to time, and there is little doubt that the increased cost of high-grade flour has to some extent increased the consumption of the lower grades.

At the same time it is matter of common knowledge that grain supplies in the interior are all but exhausted, and many of the small mills have been compelled to close down for the season as a consequence. With new crop wheat four

months away, so far as the mills are concerned, the outlook is for a continued contraction of the output, and naturally high prices as long as wheat holds up firmly.

On the prospect for the remainder of the season a local millman said today: "While I would not predict a further advance in flour prices for the immediate future, the chances are very much in favor of a lift at no very distant date, and it is not at all impossible that supplies will be near nothing that they may be said to have been exhausted before the mills of the Northwest will be able to get any new wheat. I do not believe there will be an actual flour famine, but it is clear that so far as the flour supply is concerned the situation the last month or two of the season will be the most serious known here in many years. It is practically a certainty that flour will sell at higher prices than now before the end of the season."

CHEWING-GUM.

We know of nothing, says a writer in "Success Magazine," that is quite so many things at once as mescal. First of all it is a kind of combination chewing-gum and cough drop; afterwards it is an intoxicant; but most of all it is a religion. It is pretty generally agreed that mescal is an evil, but whether it should be dealt with by a pure food expert, a policeman, or a missionary has not been decided.

Mescal is made by cutting off slices of a certain kind of cactus that grows in Mexico and our Southwest. It is dried and chewed by the Indians, and produces a kind of alleged and pleasurable sensation. Beautiful colors, lovely imaginings, and a kind of intoxication different from that produced by opium, hashish, or alcohol are said to result from its use.

The chewing of mescal is said to be spreading with dangerous rapidity among the Southwestern Indians, who have made it the basis of a new religion. Eminent chemists have investigated the tablet and have called it long, hard names. Perhaps the supply is not great enough to cause apprehension, but the danger to our institutions of a religion that can be chewed must be apparent to all.
