**THE METHODISTS TAKE A STEP.**  
THE LOCATION DECIDED UPON, CONTRACT LET, AND WORK COMMENCED ON THE CHURCH BUILDING.

Several months ago Chaplain McCabe, of Libby prison and church extension fame, visited Jamestown in company with Elder Starkey, in the interest of the Methodist church, held a meeting, ostensibly for the purpose of delivering his famous lecture on "The Bright Side of Libby Prison," raised quite a large subscription for the purpose of erecting a church building, at the same time assuring these present that work would be commenced within three weeks and a house of worship completed within ninety days. As things did not transpire as the worthy chaplain predicted, man have been inclined to regard him in the light of a braggadocio. Then the Rev. Mr. Wright came, under instructions from Presiding Elder Starkey, expecting to find a fully organized church society, and was somewhat surprised to find that nothing of the kind existed.

As the reverend gentleman had his family with him, he found himself in something of a quandary, there not being a vacant house in Jamestown, and not an unemployed carpenter to build him one. He finally went to Sanborn, also under his charge, where he met with better success, at least so far as finding a place for his family. Since that time Mr. Wright has held services on alternate Sundays in the N. P. passenger depot.

At last the contract for the building has been let to Messrs. Davidson & McKelcher, lumber ordered, and the work will be pushed with all vigor and completed before the first of July. The dimensions of the church will be 32x50, a neat and substantial structure, with a bellify. It is located at the corner of Fifth Avenue and First Street, near the school house.

This decided step looks like business, and we congratulate our Methodist friends (a denomination, by the way, largely represented in Stutsman county) on the prospect of soon being independent, meanwhile, services will continue to be held in the depot, every other Sunday, at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., by the pastor, Rev. W. M. Wright.

COUNCIL.—President, Geo. H. Walsh of Grand Forks; secretary, E. B. Dawson of Clay; assistant secretary, Moses Liverman of Lawrence; engrossing clerk, J. B. Hall of Brookings; sergeant at arms, Jacob Branch of Yankton; freman, B. S. Fuller of Minnehaha; chaplain, Rev. McReady, of Yankton.

HOUSE.—Speaker, Dr. J. A. Harding of Deadwood; chief clerk, Frank J. Mead of Mandan; assistant clerk, J. C. Pyatt of Richland; engrossing clerk, E. N. Falk, of Trail; sergeant at arms, Kaut Paulson of Turner; freman, F. K. Berry of Minnehaha; chaplain, Rev. Bronson of Yankton.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

In session Jan. 8d, 1881  
Board all present. Kelleher elected chairman for the coming year. Question of sheriff's bond taken up, and on motion was fixed at \$1,000 for the term of office. Hall was not allowed. On motion Dr. J. S. Hall was appointed county physician for the coming year, with a salary of \$100. On motion the following bonds were approved: A. A. Allen, Anton Steinbach, F. E. Jones, as justices of the peace. John J. Nichols, assessor and Will Elmer, coroner. On motion the following bills were allowed: Dr. J. S. Hall, salary, half year, ending Dec. 31, \$25. Cameron, Amberg & Co., books and stationery, \$239.70. A. McKeechie, sheriff fees, \$189.80. L. Lyon, provisions, Mrs. Enot \$4 85. T. S. Collins, postage and stationery, \$3.32. On motion the board adjourned until Jan. 10th, 1881. G. W. VENNUM, CLERK.
