THE ELECT.
 Short Biographies of the Men Who
 will Make, Administer and
 Execute the City
 Laws.

How the Four Winds of Heaven have
 Brought Together a Council
 for the City of
 Jamestown.

The City Election. Saturday passed
 very quietly and peacefully, as such
 things should and do among the more
 intelligent people. The saloons were all
 closed, not only the front door, but closed
 in fact, and no boisterous conduct was
 indulged in by any. The good order of
 such an election was a credit to the peo-
 ple of Jamestown and their votes were
 an honor to the gentlemen upon whom
 they were conferred. If any ill feeling
 has been engendered during the cam-
 paign let it be now buried with the past
 and let us all join together in the strength
 of unity to support the officers elected in
 the discharge of their official duties and
 the building up of our city in every im-
 portant interest.

The following is a brief biographical
 sketch of the several officers elected,
 which we think will be of interest to our
 readers, and which we obtained from the
 gentlemen named by a persistent applica-
 tion of the reporter's corkerew of inter-
 viewing questions; but we got it all the
 same, under whatever guise it matters
 not, and propose to give it away to our
 readers this morning without asking the
 gentlemen named whether they like it or
 not:

THE MAYOR.
 Jerome J. Flint was born at Braintree,
 Vermont, April 3, 1842, and at an early
 age removed to West Randolph, in the
 same state, where he resided until he
 came to Jamestown in June 1879. Mr.
 Flint's business life has been principally
 in buying and selling real estate, together
 with mercantile business to some extent.
 He has never been a seeker for office but
 served in the official positions of school
 superintendent and justice of the peace
 in his native state. He prepared himself
 for college and took a law course of
 a year, but at that time changed his mind
 and engaged in other business more con-
 genial to his inclinations, engaging in
 school teaching for ten or twelve years.
 On coming to Jamestown he rented the
 Dakota house for a year and then bought
 it continuing in the business until the
 first of January, 1882, when he sold out,
 since which time he has been engaged
 principally in improving his farm of 350
 acres southeast of town and within the
 incorporation, 250 acres of which he al-
 ready has in a good state of cultivation
 and upon which he will raise 100 acres of
 potatoes this year. His buildings are
 good and substantial, and with the taste
 and energy he has displayed the past year
 he will soon have a model suburban
 home and farm. Mr. Flint is now con-
 ducting his second term as a member of
 the retiring board of trustees.

POLICE MAGISTRATE.
 Lyster Haywood was born in Bucking-
 ham, England, in 1840, and came to Can-
 ada in 1855. He was for several years
 manager of the Royal Canadian bank, at
 Stratford, Ontario, and has spent a great
 many years of his business life in the
 banking business. In 1871 he went to
 Winnipeg and was for several years in-
 spector of weights and measures under
 the Dominion government in the north-
 west. While at Winnipeg, and in the
 organization of that city in 1874 he was
 elected chamberlain, an office which cor-
 responds to treasurer in American cities.
 In 1877 he went to Chicago where he
 made his headquarters as special agent of
 the Travelers' Insurance company. In
 the spring of 1881 he came to Jamestown,
 and has accumulated considerable prop-
 erty in the real estate business. He is
 now concluding a term of appointment by
 the village board as a city justice under
 the old organization.

ALDERMAN FIRST WARD.
 Walter W. Dudley was born in New
 Haven county, Connecticut, in 1845, and
 came west at an early age, engaging in
 business at Chicago, LaCrosse, St. Paul,
 and for the last eight years previous to
 his coming to Dakota had his headquar-
 ters in Chicago as adjuster for the Ger-
 man American Insurance company, of
 New York. Mr. Dudley came to Jame-
 stown in the fall of 1881, and in the or-
 ganization of the James River National bank
 was appointed its cashier which position
 he held until last January when he re-
 signed to give his entire attention to the
 increasing and extensive real estate busi-
 ness of Wells, Dudley & Co. He is a man
 of superior business ability having had
 an extended experience in finances.

ALDERMAN SECOND WARD.
 Anton Klaus was born in Prussia Dec.
 28, 1829. Came to America in 1849, and
 located at Green Bay, Wis., where he re-
 sided the ensuing thirty years, during
 which time he held many important po-
 sitions of honor and trust as follows: He
 was treasurer of Brown county Wiscon-
 sin, from 1862 to 1870; president of what
 is now the Green Bay, Minnesota & St.

Paul railroad company in 1871-2, during
 which time the first forty miles of the
 road was built; was elected to and held
 the office of mayor of the city of Green
 Bay two successive terms, in 1873-4; was
 a member of the general assembly of the
 state of Wisconsin the session of 1877-8;
 was for twenty years chief engineer of
 the fire department in Green Bay; came
 to Jamestown the spring of 1879, and has
 been identified with the rise and progress
 of the city from its infancy to the pres-
 ent time. Mr. Klaus built the Miller
 Mills, the Dakota house, the public hall,
 laid out the beautiful addition that now
 comprises the south part of town, is one
 of the company that built the Jamestown
 elevator, is proprietor of the extensive
 brickyard out east of town, is commencing
 the erection of an \$80,000 hotel, is a
 man of large business experience as well
 as business interests, and one who has an
 unflinching faith in the future of our
 town.

John F. Vennum was born at Milford,
 Ill., in 1850, where he was brought up
 and educated. On attaining adult age
 he went to Waukegan, in the same state,
 and for several years was engaged in the
 hardware and general merchandise busi-
 ness until 1880, when he came to Jame-
 stown. During the years of 1881-2 he
 served as deputy sheriff and now holds
 the office of street commissioner. In the
 time he has been here he has established
 a teaming, dray and express business that
 has grown into one of large proportions
 running some ten or twelve teams. Mr.
 Vennum is a good practical business man.

ALDERMEN THIRD WARD.
 T. W. Fields was born in Canada in
 1856, where he remained, was educated
 and learned his trade as a jeweler. In
 1876 he came to Fargo where he worked
 at his trade a couple of years and then
 came to Jamestown and engaged in the
 jewelry business which has grown to be
 an extensive one now operated by Fields
 & Co., of which firm alderman elect
 Fields is the senior member. He is a
 young man of good business abilities by
 which he has made his way in the busi-
 ness world with good success.

John McGinnis was born in Monroe
 county, N. Y., in 1854, came to Manito-
 ba in 1875 and to Jamestown in 1879.
 His business generally has been farming
 in which industry he is now engaged at
 his farm northwest of town. He is also a
 partner with Geo. W. Vennum in Capital
 Hill addition. Mr. McGinnis is a man of
 good business qualifications and will no
 doubt make an efficient alderman.

FOURTH WARD.
 Thos. S. Collins was born in Chicago,
 Ill., in 1846, lived at several different
 places in the state until 1861 when he en-
 listed in the army at Cairo in the 1st
 Cavalry Co., A., and served four years
 and seven months as a cavalry soldier,
 commencing with the war, ending with
 the collapse of the rebellion. He came to
 Minnesota in 1868 and spent two and a
 half years in the survey crew of the
 Northern Pacific railroad. In 1871 he
 came to the James River Valley, then
 beyond the bounds of civilization, and
 has been here ever since. He held the
 office of county treasurer from 1876 to
 1882, three terms, and was last fall elec-
 ted assessor for Stutsman county which
 office he now holds. In all positions of
 trust he has been a faithful public ser-
 vant, and it was a fitting tribute to his
 sterling integrity as a man and an officer
 that he was made a member of the first
 city council of the city he has aided from
 its infancy to develop into its present
 status.

Cassius M. Carr was born in Cortland,
 N. Y., Sept. 5, 1847. He was admitted
 to the practice of law and licensed as an
 attorney at Syracuse in 1870, was two
 years city clerk and two years city attor-
 ney of Homer, in that state. He came
 to Charles City, Iowa, in 1876, in which
 place he served two years as alderman.
 He came to Jamestown two years ago
 and is engaged in the livery business be-
 coming a member of the firm of Waller &
 Carr. Mr. Carr is a thoroughly qualified
 business man.

Telegraphic Briefs.
 MILWAUKEE, April 10.—The trial of Geo.
 Scheller, charged with setting the New-
 York house on fire, began to-day. A jury
 was empanelled and witnesses will com-
 mence to be examined to-morrow. The
 defense will try to establish that Scheller
 through his financial embarrassment set
 fire to his hotel to get the insurance
 money.

DELETH, April 10.—A heavy storm
 raging since last night. Snow six inches
 deep and badly drifted in some places.

PENNSACOLA, April 10.—The President
 has accepted an invitation to visit this city
 and Tallahassee.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 10.—Heavy
 rains reported in all parts of the State.
 It will not do much damage. A mob
 consisting of seventy-five negroes and six
 white men took from the grand Chert-
