GERMANS CLAIM ALLIES FAIL TO MAKE BIG GAINS

Heavy Fighting on Somme Continued Throughout the Night. RUSSIANS ARE SHOVED BACK Teutons Repulse violent Attack, Says Official Statement.

Berlin, July 5.—via London.—Violent fighting between the Germans and the entente allies on both sides of the Somme was continuous since last night, says an official statement from army headquarters. Up to the present time the statement adds, the allies have nowhere obtained serious advantages. Russians Repulsed. The Russians are again attacking the German line from Zirin to a region southeast of Baranovichi in Lithuania, says a German statement, adding that the Russians were either repulsed or driven back from places where they broke into the German lines, suffering heavy losses. Violent hand to hand fighting is progressing, the statement says.

BOARD OF REGENTS MEETS TOMORROW

Will Gather at Bismarck to Let Contracts for Year—McVey to Attend Session Saturday. The State Board of Regents for all state institutions, will convene at Bismarck tomorrow in an important business session. It will be the business of this meeting to let all the contracts for food and supplies for these institutions in all parts of the state. One of the largest contracts will be for coal for all these plants. Pres. F. L. McVey of the state university will appear before the board on July 8th, the third day of the session, for the purpose of presenting some university matter for the consideration of the board.

WISCONSIN GUARDS REACH THE BORDER

San Antonio, Texas, July 5.—The Third and Fourth Illinois infantry reached here today and went into camp. The first Wisconsin troops to get into the south, a troop and a battery, from Milwaukee, also arrived. To complete the reserve force here, there remained the Eighth Illinois and three Wisconsin regiments.

Large Crowds Throng to Hear Concert and View Sport Events. All day yesterday East Grand Forks was thronged with people in attendance at the Fourth of July celebration given by the band. Every one declared the affair an unalloyed success. The band concert began at 2:30 o'clock in the park. The program of patriotic and classic music interspersed the sport events of the day.

SIX DRUNKS ARE SENTENCED TODAY

All Claim They Obtained Liquor Out of Town—Heavy Sentences Imposed. In municipal court this morning, Judge Robert Blair imposed sentences on six men who had been picked up on the streets in this city in various degrees of intoxication on the preceding evening. All of the men stoutly maintained that they had obtained their liquor out of town. Some of them complained of having lost money or other valuable belongings while in the company of their fellow celebrators.
