It was announced that a statement would be made regarding the extraordinary voyage by officials of the North German Lloyd company later today.

The Deutschland anchored below Baltimore last night, after voyaging safely across the Atlantic, past the allied blockading squadrons and eluding enemy cruisers watching for her of the American coast. She carries 1,450 tons of cargo of tons of costly chemicals and dye stuffs and is to carry back home a similar amount of nickel and crude rubber, sorely needed by the German army.

Fifteen days out from Bremerhaven to Baltimore, the submarine reached safely between the Virginia Capes at 1:45 o'clock Sunday morning, passing in on the surface except to Lake Forest, and, as the most guilty act of all, to the alibi letters to Marion and to his mother.
