


\$78,000 LAND DEAL CLOSED POLK COUNTY LOSES PIONEER

Illinois Parties Purchase 1,200 Acres of Polk County Land. Wm. Fleming, Who Came in 1871, Died at 3 O'clock This Morning.

This morning there was closed at the office of Sullivan Bros. in this city one of the biggest land deals which has occurred in Polk county for some time. H. G. Gibbs, a wealthy real estate man of Princeton, Ill., and L. R. Davis, president of the Farmers National bank of Princeton, purchased a tract of land consisting of 1,200 acres, and lying in Northland, Sullivan and Keystone townships, a few miles east of East Grand Forks. The purchase price was for \$78,000. The purchasers of this land are well acquainted with this county. Mr. Gibbs is already an owner of Polk county land, having for several years owned the section farmed by John Sullivan. This fact is of particular significance showing that the purchasers are investing only after knowing conditions in the county thoroughly. This evidence of faith in Polk county and the Red River Valley is just another proof of the wonderful opportunities of this section. Mr. Gibbs arrived in this city this morning for the purpose of closing the deal. He will stay here for some time as the guest of friends. The purchasers of the land intend to continue farming operations as at present carried on, for some time at least.

CLEAN-UP IN CITY ORDERED

City Officials Order Clean-up to Safeguard Health. Mayor Kelleher and the city health officers of East Grand Forks are taking precautions that the dreaded disease of infantile paralysis shall not get a foothold in this city. A conference of these authorities was held yesterday and it was decided to have a clean-up campaign in this city at once. All refuse of every kind must be removed to a place where its presence will not be a menace to health. Owners of vacant lots must cut the weeds and clean these places up. Unless such lots are cleaned the work will be done by the city and the expense charged to the property owner.

That the city is willing to go half way on this proposition is manifested by the following offer: Provided, that the citizens do their cleaning up tomorrow, July 14th, and place the refuse in neat piles in the alleys back of their yards, the city wagons will call and cart it away without charge to the owners. This is a fair proposal and it should encourage an immediate campaign of sanitation in our city. That the danger of the dread disease which is now devastating so many homes in the east is very real even in this section of the country, is evident from the fact that there is at least one case of the disease in Bemidji at the present time. It pays all property owners to take action which will relieve them of any responsibility should this disease break out here.
