TWO HUNDRED ON AUTO TRIP

Big Crowd of Grand Forks Boosters Auto to Crookston to Attend Fair.

Between 50 and 100 automobiles from Grand Forks, packed with business men and their ladies, headed for Crookston this morning to be present at the Northwestern fair which is being held in that city. Today is Grand Forks and East Grand Forks day, designated by the Crookston management, and over 200 residents of this city are in attendance.

Many of the cars left here early this morning while the majority comprised a procession that left here between 12 and 1 o'clock for the Queen city.

At Crookston they were met by the city band and the juvenile band, an organization comprised of 56 pieces. Concerts are being held at the fair grounds throughout the afternoon, and an excellent race card is being staged as the chief attraction. This evening a big fire works display will be held for the benefit of the visitors. The juvenile band of Crookston will be one of the musical organizations to appear at the Grand Forks fair, and the members will be bedecked in new uniforms for which the citizens of Crookston are now raising funds to purchase.

BORDEN PRAISES SPIRIT OF FRANCE

Ottawa, July 14.—On France's fete day, July 14, Sir Robert Borden has issued a message. In part it says: "The anniversary of the national fete day of France brings with it the undying memory of all that the French nation has endured and accomplished during the past two years. No words of appreciation are needed, because all the world knows that glorious record. A year ago I was in France and had the opportunity of

learning at first hand something of the spirit and the achievements of her people. It would be impossible to describe, in measured terms, the indelible impression made upon me by the serious courage, the resolute patience and the strong self-control of the French people.

"Magnificent courage, unflinching confidence, indomitable determination, a splendid self-control; thus would I describe the spirit of the French people as it impressed me. The French armies, with those of our own empire, are pressing, with success, the attack on the western front. With them is an army corps from this dominion, which has abundantly proved that Canadians are not unworthy to fight in the empire's armies and beside those of France in the same great cause. NORTH SEA FIGHT STIFFENED TERMS

Stockholm, July 14.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Regardless of the decision, history ultimately will record as to victor and vanquished in the great North Sea naval fight of May 31 and June 1, there is no denying the fact that the battle brought a sudden stiffening to the so-called "war party" in Germany. All talk of Germany being willing to end the war on a basis of the antebellum status quo ended.

Here are the terms. It is being given out now in neutral Europe that Germany will require "a slight rectification of her frontier at the expense of Belgium and that it will be necessary for the central powers to keep a strip of Serbia in order that the railway to Constantinople shall always run through 'friendly territory.'" Germany has always maintained that her colonies should be returned to her. It is now added that there must be compensation for German losses in the Congo. "Something also must be done," it is stated, "to keep Belgium from being the vassal state of England."
