

# RUST IS FOUND IN NUMBER OF WHEAT FIELDS

## Edgar I. Olsen Investigates Conditions Throughout Northwest Section.

### Still in Early Stage But the Weather Conditions Are Ideal for Spreading.

Many wheat fields throughout the northwestern section of Grand Forks county have been affected by rust, according to Edgar I. Olsen, field agent for the Grand Forks County Better Farming association who returned this morning from an extensive trip through the rural districts. Speaking of the investigation made while on the trip, Mr. Olsen said: "Judging from conditions at present, the damage from rust will be considerable. An examination of a great many fields during the past few days has shown that rust is present in nearly every instance. "There are two varieties of rust that cause the most damage to the wheat plant. The orange leaf rust, is found on the leaves of the plant and causes considerable damage. The black rust, or stem rust, is found principally on the leaf sheath and the stem. "The stem rust, commonly known as the black rust, is reddish in color during its earlier stages, later turning black. According to the department of botany of the South Dakota state college, the damage to the plant is done while in the red stage. When the spores are black they are what is known as the teliospores in which condition they live all winter. When in this condition, it is very difficult, if at all possible to get them to germinate. "The weather has been very favorable for the germination of the rust spores. The heavy dews in the morning with the occasional light showers, followed by an exceptionally hot wave, provides an ideal condition for the germination of the rust spores. "The spores are carried from infected plants to others by the wind, and then with moisture and heat, they

germinate rapidly, taking the plant food that ordinarily is consumed in the development of the berry. "The crops as a whole, however, appear good. The damage done by the rust will of course depend on the weather conditions between now and harvest. Some damage has already taken place from rust, but should the weather conditions improve, the loss from this source would not be very great. "Mr. Olsen stated that last year, the first indication of rust found by him was on July 14 on both velvet chaff and blue stem wheat. The weather following was not favorable for the development of rust as the past week has been and in addition, the crops were further advanced. "Weeds throughout Grand Forks county are also proving an annoyance to the farmers and in many instances it has been impossible to destroy these noxious plants without cutting the entire field. A heavy loss will result from this source.

# ONE DRUNK NABBED BY LOCAL POLICE

# MORDEN PIONEER CALLED BY DEATH

Morden, Man., July 15.—Thomas Smith, winner of a diploma for growing the best 10 bushels of wheat in the world at the world's fair in England in 1886, and Manitoba pioneer, died here yesterday at the advanced age of 84 years. Mr. Smith was born in Lincolnshire, England, Dec. 21, 1832. He married in 1854, and emigrated to Canada in 1869, settling in Ontario. In 1883 he came to Manitoba, and has since that time received the sum of 50 cents a bushel for it. In politics Mr. Smith was a Liberal, while both he and his wife attended the Methodist church.

# EXPERTS TO PROBE CANADIAN ROADS

Ottawa, July 15.—Alfred R. Smith, president of the New York Central lines; Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the board of railway commissioners for Canada; and Sir George Paish, the eminent British statistician, are the members of a commission appointed to enquire into the condition of Canadian railways, according to an official announcement made in the government press this morning. The investigations of this commission may lead to a broad system of nationalization of transcontinental lines. The appointment of this commission is the outcome of the announcement made in the last session of parliament, when the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific railways were granted further aid that a full inquiry would be instituted into conditions. The full report of the commission was only determined yesterday, along with the order-in-council outlining the scope of the inquiry, which is sufficiently wide to insure full consideration of all determinable questions.

One important question which the commission must pronounce upon is the advisability of the reorganization of any of the transcontinental systems or the acquisition thereof by the state. A full report of the physical conditions of each road is to be made. The national political campaign will not open until the letters of acceptance of the presidential nominees are issued.

Even an innocent visit to such offices may have the most unpleasant, if not dangerous consequences for the eyes and the ears of the opposing party are ever on the watch and several Rotterdam men have long been incarcerated in foreign prisons merely on such a ground. Significant in this connection is the recent dismissal from the police service of the chief of the bureau of Amsterdam, for having entered into well-paid clandestine relations with the German secret service. Their "side line" included, among other jobs, the watching of persons of different nationalities who had applied for passports to enter Germany, but concerning whom the German authorities entertained misgivings. Investigations are now afoot to ascertain whether other police officials in the chief line of Holland may not have yielded to German temptations.

# STEAMER LIBELED FOLLOWING TRIP

Detroit, Mich., July 15.—When the passenger steamer South American reached Detroit from Buffalo today with a large crowd of Shriners aboard was seized by United States marshal. Libel proceedings have been started against the owners of the vessel by ten Detroit persons who alleged that the contestants typhoid fever by drinking water on the South American during an excursion a year ago. They ask for \$75,000 damages. The vessel probably will be released when the owners file a bond.

The South American is owned by the Chicago, Duluth and Georgian Bay Transit company.

# COUNTY BOARD MAKES LEVIES FOR 1916 YEAR

## Many Reductions Shown Over the Levy of 1915—Bridge Fund Increased.

For the county fair, one quarter mill on all taxable property, real estate and personal, was also voted for the support of the Better Farming association, but this was voted down at the June primaries and no levy was made for this purpose this year, meaning a saving of about \$4,000.

Excluding the levy for the fair, the entire levy amounts to only \$174,500 for 1916, while in 1915 the levy amounted to \$183,556, excluding the fair and better farming association tax.

The figures, as compiled by County Auditor Hans Anderson, show an actual saving this year of about \$10,000. An increased levy was made this year for the construction of bridges in the county, but this has been made necessary by the damage done throughout the county by the storms and floods. A great many bridges have been washed out and as these will have to be reconstructed, it was necessary to make a larger levy for this purpose. Although 22 miles of Grand Forks county roads are being re-constructed this summer, the levy was not increased.

The levy for county purposes include the salaries of all officials, postage, rentals and incidentals. This expense has been cut \$2,556.

# SEVER SUNDEEN IS SENTENCED

## Petition Presented to Court Asking that Leniency be Shown Defendant.

Sever Sundeen, who pleaded guilty in district court last week, to the charge of selling liquor without a license, was sentenced this afternoon by Judge C. M. Cooley to 120 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$200 and costs amounting to \$30. The jail sentence was suspended providing the defendant pay the fine and costs. A petition was presented to the court on which the names of prominent business men of the city appeared, asking that leniency be shown the defendant.

Sundeen was arrested several weeks ago following an investigation made by a Fargo detective. The case of Sundeen makes the sixth liquor charge which resulted from the work of the detective and which has been disposed of. Every charge lodged resulted in a conviction. State's Attorney O. B. Burtness prosecuted in each instance.
