HARD FIGHT ON TONIGHT

Unusual Interest is Being Manifested in School Election.

The election of two members to the school board of independent district No. 3, in which the schools of East Grand Forks are included, promises to develop a hard fight today.

The election occurs in the Central school building tonight at 7 o'clock. The terms of two members of the present board expire shortly and the contest tonight will be over the election of their successors. The members whose terms expire are John Bailey and Thomas Powers. Mr. Powers is a candidate for re-election and his supporters have paired him with L. O. Lystad, since Mr. Bailey does not seek re-election.

Opposing these two men are N. J. Nelson and T. P. Daily, the election of whom is being worked for by many ardent supporters. In view of the fact that there is really no issue at stake in this contest, the amount of interest aroused is a matter of some surprise.

There are five members of the school board as at present constituted. Besides the two already named there are Mrs. F. C. Masse, Mrs. F. W. Kolars, and J. R. Johnson. The term of office is three years.

INSTALLING LARGER GASOLINE STATION

Queen City Auto Co. Secure Larger Equipment to Care for Increasing Sale of Gasoline.

Stood Highest in Shoot of Local Gun Club—Cup Given by Interstate Association.

The East Grand Forks Gun Club recently completed a ten weeks' shoot conducted in competition for a fine silver cup offered as prize for the best score in a contest for beginners.

The local club was won by Al Noyes of this city who was found to have the best record for the period with a total of 188 birds out of a possible 200.

A great deal of interest developed in this shoot. About 25 of the 28 members of the club took part in the contest and some very close scores resulted. Second high man was Roy Moriarty with 176; third, F. M. Biglow with 175; fourth, H. H. Hurley with 170; and fifth, J. S. Peterson with 167.

GENERAL DISPOSES TROOPS FOR DRIVE

Chihuahua City July 15.—General Matias Ramos, directing the government forces operating against Villista bandits in southern Chihuahua, is re-disposing his troops preparatory to a quick, powerful drive which, it is hoped, will clear the outlaw's power in that section. General Jacinto Trevino, military commander of the northeast, announced tonight.

Reports from General Ramos, who has established his base of operations at Parral, said that he had the main bandit forces practically surrounded south of Sombrerito, and expected to force a fight as soon as he had his local commands disposed to his liking.

Following an inspection trip to Rosario, he dispatched heavy reinforcements from Parral for the Rosario garrison. General Ramos reported that he was moving these troops "with a view to future operations" and added that a larger garrison at Rosario is necessary because of the heavy losses suffered by the Carranzista forces at Corralitos, San Salvador and Cerro Blanco.

MORE SHARKS SEEN IN NORTHERN WATER

New York, July 15.—A large school of shark, several of which came close to the vessel, was sighted a fortnight ago by the British full-rigged ship Cumberland, which arrived today from Antofagasta, Chile, after a 184-day voyage. One about eight feet long was caught and killed. Captain Bartfield said he saw one large shark about three days ago and that never before in his long career on the sea had he seen sharks so far north.
