

ELEVATOR MEN TO GATHER IN CITY THURSDAY

Managers of North Dakota Co-operative Concerns to Hold Convention.

Business Session of Two Days' Duration to be Ended with Sports.

On Thursday and Friday of this week, the fourth annual convention of the North Dakota Association of Managers of Farmers' Co-operative Elevator companies will be held in Grand Forks.

The purpose of the gathering will be to solve the problems that have arisen during the past year that are proving obstacles to the movement that is being made to build up the branch elevators throughout the state. The organization that will meet in Grand Forks is the most progressive and largest of the kind in the state of North Dakota and it is now expected that several hundred will be in attendance.

To benefit farmers. The management of the elevator business will be one of the principal subjects taken up during the meetings in Grand Forks, but every phase of the business will be discussed for the purpose of making the association a more valuable asset to the farmers in general.

Although the managers will be the principal participants in the programs, the public may attend each gathering and those interested in the work of the co-operative elevator companies and the members of the firms, may gain a more vivid idea of the assistance to the farmers offered by the grain dealers, who are farmers.

SUBDUES MAD BULL BY HAND

Jesse Coulter Overcomes Vicious Animal by Brute Strength.

Jesse Coulter, the well known dairyman of the east side, was in Grand Forks today for the first time since his encounter on Thursday evening with a vicious bull of his dairy herd.

The story of the encounter reads almost like that of a gladiatorial contest of ancient Rome. It seems that Mr. Coulter was attacked by his five thoroughbred bull in the middle of a pasture on his farm a few miles east of East Grand Forks. He was absolutely unarmed at the time and too far from shelter to make a run for it.

The bull charged Mr. Coulter viciously knocking him down four times and trampling upon him, bruising him terribly about the body and face. After taking punishment that would have killed an ordinary man, Mr. Coulter got his arm about the shaggy neck of the infuriated animal, and with almost superhuman strength swung himself on the back of the animal. He then reached over and grasped the ring in the bull's nose, twisting the vicious head back and bringing the animal into submission.

After having subdued the brute from this difficult position, Mr. Coulter got off and led the bull to the place where he securely tied him, thus completing his conquest of the animal. The fact that Mr. Coulter is a big man with a magnificent physique and wonderful strength, alone explains his ability to bear all of this punishment and still be able to subdue the animal afterwards.

Attorney J. B. Wineman has been retained by Mr. Williams. The plaintiff in the action claims that until recently he was of the belief that he was the seventh choice and that he had taken the matrimonial vows six times before meeting his wife. The plaintiff also declares that his wife deserted him in South Dakota, and that she accepted a position as cook for a boarding house, which was the beginning of the storm during their matrimonial venture. They have been married for about two years, according to information in the hands of the attorney.

It is not known as yet whether or not Mrs. Williams will attempt to fight the charges, or whether her husband in his contention that he is entitled to legal separation.

That Mrs. Booker T. Washington, widow of the famous negro educator, who speaks at the University and at the Methodist church tomorrow, will have a message that will be of especial interest to everyone interested in the uplift of the negro and of humanity in general, is assured.

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Sleeper of Mohall, N. D., who have been spending some time at the University under conditions, wired Dr. S. P. Robertson of Wesley College this morning that Mrs. Washington will have a great story on how they do things Dixie.

In a recent letter, Mr. Sleeper tells some interesting things of the famous institution with which Mrs. Washington is connected. For years Mrs. Washington has been recognized as the organization head of the institution. Her illustrious husband was the advocate and the solicitor, while his wife was the organizer of the work and the executor of the policies.

Tuskegee is in truth a remarkable institution. Only the poor among negro youth are admitted. Any person who is able to pay the tuition of \$72 a year is asked to seek education elsewhere, since the institution wishes to reach only those who could not possibly be gotten hold of otherwise.

It is an interesting fact that all of the buildings at Tuskegee have been erected by students under the supervision of the faculty. Every student at this great institution is required to accept responsibilities in some department of the institution, before he is allowed to graduate. In this way the assumption of responsibilities and actual performance of the duties of life, is taught the student as well as is the theory of the work.

Provision is being made for her entertainment in this city tomorrow. A conference with the women of the city probably will be arranged at the Y. W. C. A. rooms or at the Commons at the University. She will be the guest of Mrs. P. R. Miller, 408 North Seventh street, at a 5 o'clock luncheon tomorrow afternoon, to which ten ladies have been invited.

SCHOOL BOARD RAISES LEVY

Brought Necessity of \$9,500 Increase.

At special meeting of the city school board held last Saturday afternoon, the levy for the ensuing year was set at \$128,000, showing an increase of \$9,500 over the levy of last year.

The increase was made necessary by the added cost of constructing the new high school building of Grand Forks, as estimated by the contractors who will have bids entered for the work at the meeting to be held on July 21.

It is authoritatively claimed that the new building will cost approximately \$18,000 more than that it would have at the time when the bids were first let, and because of this fact, it was found necessary to make one of the largest increases ever made in a single levy for one year by the local board.

Several other important business matters are pending the action of the board and special meetings will be held throughout the remainder of the week.
