Walter Matscheck, graduate of the University of North Dakota with a B. A. degree in 1913, is now director of the Efficiency Bureau of the state of Wisconsin.



RUST WIDESPREAD IN THIS SECTION

Reports from Neighboring Communities Tell of Considerable Rust on Wheat Plants.

That indications of both red and black rust are abundant in this section of the state, is evidenced by reports received from neighboring towns. The weather of the past two or three weeks have been ideal for the propagation and spreading of the dreaded rust spores.

It is still in its early stages. Red rust is abundant. The early crops are looking well, several fields have already headed out.

J. B. Stone, president of the First National Bank of Drayton, says, "Black rust is quite prevalent in this section, although but in its earliest stages. The extent of damage that will be done depends entirely on the weather conditions of the next few weeks."

NEW SERVICE FOR AMERICANS

Stretcher-Bearers, Who can Play Band Instruments, Are Sought.

Toronto, Ont., July 17.—Lieut. Col. B. J. McCormick, Commanding Officer of the American Legion in Toronto, has issued an appeal for stretcher-bearers, for his Battalion, that are able to play some sort of band instruments, and is urging Americans in Canada to come forward at once for this non-combatant service.

"Thousands of Americans," he said, "have been trying to get into various red-cross units going overseas, to the French and English Armies. Naturally, only a few out of the hundreds of applications to the red-cross authorities can be utilized, and many who would like to go on an errand of mercy are deterred, because there is no opportunity offered them. In organizing the American Legion here in Canada, we have always studiously avoided violation of neutrality laws of the United States, and have never in any way invited men to cross the border line to enlist with us. I do not think it a violation of neutrality to put before the people of the United States an opportunity for thirty young men to enlist as non-combatants, for the relief of misery on the field of battle. These men will never under any circumstances be called upon to take up arms, but they will go right into the front line trenches to aid the wounded. I should think many would respond, and be glad to go with 6,000 of their countrymen, who have each and every one enlisted in the American Legion because they feel it their duty to help defend civilization."

cause they feel it their duty to help defend civilization. The stretcher-bearers, before entering the trenches comprise the Band, and that is why we want musicians in this capacity. The Band gives great pleasure to the soldiers, and is in itself a good and noble relief work. Musicians do not have to know anything about first aid work, but will be given their course as soon as they arrive at American Legion Headquarters in Toronto."

Large Supplies of Drugs to Be Used By the Government

St. Louis, Mo., July 17.—Drugs and hospital supplies valued at \$1,000,000 will be bought in St. Louis by the United States government within the next sixty days, according to information received at the United States medical supply department.

BOY RUN DOWN BY AUTO AND MAY DIE

The lad, with a group of boys, was playing in the street, becoming confused when the autoist sounded his horn. Two wheels passed over the boy's body, breaking several ribs and causing internal injuries which it is feared may cause death.

MEDIC BOARD REVOKES LICENSE

Sharon Physician Will Not be Allowed to Practice in State.

The state board of Medical Examiners of North Dakota, in their session in this city this month began an investigation of the record of Dr. Heber Wilson Coulter of Sharon, N. D., and have found that he is not entitled to a license as practicing physician in this state.

The license which was given to Mr. Coulter was in reciprocity with South Dakota, and was granted in 1913. Upon further investigation by the board, it has been found that fraudulent means have evidently been used in obtaining the license. It appears that Dr. Coulter has been working under the application of one Herbert Coulter, and is not the man the South Dakota board certified to at all. The medical board notified Dr. Coulter to appear before the board at its recent meeting. He failed to appear, and the board thereupon considered the evidence sufficient for a revocation of the license.

SCHOOLS REOPENED. Warsaw, July 17.—The German military administration has allowed the revival of the Polish School society, which the Russians had prohibited in the year 1907. The society will now organize branches in all the chief towns and will open primary, intermediate, and high schools at many places. Libraries will be established, lecture courses for educational purposes will be instituted, and pedagogical and other scientific periodicals will be published by the society.
