DARK HORSE IN GOLF TOURNEY

Eighteen Year Old Boy Turns in Low Score in Western Meet.

Del Monte, Cal., July 18.—C. S. Manghan, a youth of 18, who carried the colors of the San Antonio, Tex., Golf and Country club, developed as the "dark horse" of the first leg of the qualifying round in the eighteenth annual championship tournament of the Western Golf association.

Manghan negotiated the course in 33 strokes—two strokes less than were required by Heinrich Schmidt of the Claremont Golf and Country club, whose card of 73 carried off the morning honors.

Manghan's long carry from the tee coupled with his demonstration of excellent general field play, has made him the favorite for the entire qualifying round which ends today.

Low scores were not the rule for the notables of the tourney and players who are considered likely candidates for the championship fight did little in the way of impressive golf.

J. S. Worthington of the Mid-Surrey Golf club, England, who recently captured the Irish championship, took 74 strokes for his journey, as also did E. S. Armstrong, the California champion.

The sixty-four players turning in the lowest cards in yesterday's play will continue today over the same eighteen holes and the lowest thirty-two of these will compose the championship flight.

Practically none of those expected to figure in the championship were eliminated by yesterday's play.

"MOVIE" THEATERS PLACED IN SALOONS

London, June 20. (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—"Movie" theaters in saloons are one of the innovations made by the government liquor board in its experiment in the management of saloons in the south of Scotland and the north of England, where there are large munition making areas.

Heavy drinking has necessitated the step. By remodeling and rebuilding these saloons the government hopes to increase the comfort of the workers.

The picture palaces—under the same roof as the saloons—are so arranged that the men who formerly frequented the saloons in search of amusement, will be able to take their wives, and whether they desire to have drinks or not matters little.

The man who does not approve of saloons can find a part set aside for the consumption of tea, coffee and other soft drinks. The theater will also be used for concerts and lectures.

The experiment is being watched critically, not by the liquor trade but by temperance reformers and prohibitionists. In Edinburgh for instance it has been noticed that the saloons in the experimental area had doubled their receipts since private control and management had been displaced by the government board, and the local reforming leaders, are contending that the more "model" and club-like a drinking-shop is made the more drink it will sell.

Another criticism made by the reform element is that as the new model houses are not under the same strict police supervision as the ordinary saloons.

PERFUMES SOLD IN ORDINARY VIALS

Paris, July 18.—Fine French perfumes are now being sold in ordinary drugstore vials, corked, instead of in artistic flacons with glass stoppers.

This crisis is due to mobilization of glass workers in the north of France, and one of its revelations is that the art flacon has been representing a considerable part of the cost of perfumes. But among fastidious women the perfumes do not smell so sweet when prosaically presented, and a result is a new industry—that of collecting old perfume bottles into which the essences may be transferred.
