HONOR MEMORY OF MEXICAN HERO

Mexico City, July 19.—An imposing celebration presided over by the First chief, who was accompanied by the members of his cabinet, was held here yesterday in honor of the anniversary of the death of Benito Juarez, the national hero of Mexico. More than 40,000 persons, including delegations from the schools, clubs and the government bureaus, took part in the celebration. Several military bands were present, and the streets were decorated with flags. The speaker declared for a stronger foreign policy as regards Mexico and the rest of the world, good roads, an amendment to the primary law, woman suffrage and against militarism.

REPORT ON SINKING OF DUTCH STEAMER

Amsterdam, July 19.—The Dutch shipping council which investigated the torpedoing of the Dutch steamer Rindijk last April, off the Bally Islands, finds that the steamer was struck by a torpedo constructed at Flung, the naval base of Austria-Hungary on the Adriatic sea.

The Rindijk was disabled by the torpedo and was later towed to harbor with her holds full of water, which damaged her cargo. When torpedoed the Rindijk was bound from Portland for Rotterdam.

TORNADO DAMAGE IN SOUTH DAKOTA

Belle Fourche, S. D., July 19.—A tornado which struck here last night, accompanied by rain, had heavily damaged buildings and the growing crops. The storm was the most severe in the adjoining valley. Messager reports that three people were injured near here.

TO RESUME WORK. Madrid, July 19.—The striking railway employes agreed today to resume work immediately. It was decided that their interests would be safeguarded by the plan of arbitration proposed by the government.

STRONG PROHIBITION DECLARATION IS MADE

Des Moines, Iowa, July 19.—An uncompromising declaration in favor of prohibition featured the address today before the Iowa State Republican convention by Burgess W. Garret, temporary chairman. Cheers greeted the statement that "no act of the Republican party ever will bring the saloon back to Iowa." The speaker also declared for a stronger foreign policy as regards Mexico and the rest of the world, good roads, an amendment to the primary law, woman suffrage and against militarism.

HAZARDOUS RATE 'ACTION APPROVED'

Denver, Col., July 19.—Action of head officers in setting aside the "hazardous rate" for insurance on members who are serving in the national guard on the Mexican border or at concentration camps, was approved at yesterday's session of the triennial convention of the Woodmen of the World, Pacific jurisdiction. The Pacific jurisdiction has a present membership of 115,000 in 829 camps located in nine western states, according to reports of officers presented today.

The report of I. I. Book, head consul, pointed out that there is now a surplus of approximately \$8,000,000. The death claims for the last three years numbered 2,945 for a total of \$5,059,020, according to the report of C. B. Benson, head clerk. It was shown that the average payment was \$1,716, the average age a little more than 48 years, and the average duration of membership more than eleven years. The highest death rate was among farmers and the lowest among ministers.

MARSHALL MUST ANSWER HOUSE

New York, July 19.—The writ of habeas corpus was sworn out by United States District Attorney H. Snowden Marshall to prevent his removal to Washington to answer for alleged contempt of the house of representatives. He was dismissed today by Federal Judge Hand. Marshall was remanded to the custody of Robert B. Gordon, sergeant-at-arms of the house.

WAR DEPARTMENT SUSTAINS ACTION

Washington, July 19.—The war department today sustained the action of Major General Leonard Wood in ordering Colonel Louis D. Conley and Lieutenant Colonel John J. Phelan, of the sixty-ninth New York infantry, mustered out of the federal service on account of physical disability.

ROOSTER ATTACKS TWO-YEAR-OLD BOY

Joliet, Ill., July 19.—Leo Palace, 2-years-old, was attacked by a rooster which he was trying to chase today and as a result is in a serious condition. The rooster struck him on the head, endeavoring to escape, fell. The rooster pecked him in the head, striking a suture in the child's skull with his beak, rendering it unconscious. Late today the child had not recovered consciousness. Because of the attack, the boy's mother asked the police to arrest the rooster, which belongs to a neighbor.

SHIP IS SUNK

London, July 19.—A Lloyd's dispatch from Algiers says the Italian steamship Angelo was sunk by a submarine. The crew was landed. The Greek steamship Evangelistria is believed to have been sunk.

Sheriff Meining's headquarters here is not taking the attitude that the strike is over. It was stated, however, that some men are going to work in the mines. Some new deputies have been added to the sheriff's range force, and the orders all along the line are not in any degree to relax the strict vigilance that has been maintained to prevent demonstrations, intimidation or disorder.

Wiltonhall, Unarmed Ship, is Sent Down

London, July 19.—Lloyds announced that the British steamer Wiltonhall has been sunk. She was unarmed.
