Dr. Beardsley and family motored yesterday to Walhalla Tuesday evening.



with the national convention or that party.

"Women because of their keener appreciation of the value of human life must and will be counted in the future in all the national and world councils. If men are unwilling to admit them they will call their own congresses for the salvation of the race."

"Even in Germany the kaiser's favorite saying of Woman is fast passing away. That woman was designed to serve only according to his three K's, 'Kueche, Kirche and Kinder,' or, as someone has translated it, 'Kitchen, Kids and Kirk', is receiving a severe jolt with half a million German women making war material.

"Men consider first economic results, the extension of power and the acquisition of territory. Women consider first the great sacrifices of human life and the loss of those most dear to them.

"We in this country are facing new conditions, and it is well that we as women stop and think and take heed that 'new conditions teach new duties, time makes ancient good uncouth.'

"Four million women in the United States are armed with the ballot, an unfired power in the hands of thousands, to change not only conditions but ideals. Ninety-one electoral



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
