Lakota, N. D., July 22.—Monday, July 24 will be a red letter day in Lakota when one of the grandest celebrations ever attempted in this section will be given, and preparations are being made for an exceptionally large attendance.

One of the main attractions of the day will be the flying machine. Baxter Adams, who is conceded to be one of the greatest aviators in the country, will make two flights, looping the loop, flying upside down and performing other wonderful feats.

Another good number on the program will be a first class base ball game between Aneta and Edmore, two real fast teams, for a purse of \$100.00. The game will be called at 2:00 p. m.

## FAST BALL GAME PLAYED IN CAMP

 Fort Lincoln, N. D., July 22.—That the First North Dakota infantry, stationed here awaiting orders to depart for the Mexican border, will leave Saturday or Sunday, is the belief of regimental officers and men. Tex., will be the destination of the state troops.

The men stationed here in camp are all in the best of spirits, and are making the best of the steady routine of camp life.

Last evening, hundreds of soldiers and civilians watched a ball game between the First and Third battalions, the First defeating the Third by a score of 5 to 1, in a live inning game.

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
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## MANY STATES SEND NAVAL MILITIAMEN FOR PRACTISE CRUISE ON BATTLESHIPS

New York, July 21.—The most important maneuvers in which the naval militia of the eastern territory of the United States has ever participated opened a few days ago, when battleships, submarines and cruisers having on board the civilian sailors started on the fifteen-day training cruise.

The battleships on which the navy's civilian reserves have gone to sea are all units of the Atlantic reserve fleet, under command of Rear Admiral John M. Helm. The vessels are the Kentucky, Kearsarge, Maine, New Jersey, Illinois, Alabama, Rhode Island, Louisiana and Virginia. The states represented by militia battalions are New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Maryland, South Carolina, Florida, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, Illinois, North Carolina, Louisiana, Texas, Michigan and Connecticut.

During the cruise the enlisted men will be paired with bluejackets of the regular service of corresponding grades and it will be the duty of each bluejacket to instruct the civilian comrade in the duties that the militiamen would have to perform in the event the naval militia were called into active service in time of war. For instance, a regular gunner will be paired with a militia gunner, a regular quartermaster with a militia quartermaster, and so on through the various enlisted grades.

The same procedure will be followed with the officers, the regular navigator having as his pupil the navigating officer of the militia battalion.

Devils Lake, N. D., July 22.—Carroll Jones, the young son of Dr. W. D. Jones, was the victim of a serious accident at the lake when going off the high dive. Upon hitting the water he had presence of mind to swim to the raft, where he clung until someone came to his assistance. Except for the serious cut under his chin and some severe bruises he was little the worse for his fall.
