N. DAK. GUARD DEPARTS FOR BORDER TODAY

First Battalion Left at 2 O'clock This Afternoon—Others Follow Tonight.

LATER ENTRAINING. Bismarck, N. D., July 22.—Sloping cars for two battalions of the First regiment are waiting on the spur at Camp Lincoln for the troops to entrain. Orders were first given to go aboard at 2 p. m. but it probably will be six o'clock before the ten specials leave the camp for Mercedes, Texas. The third battalion probably will entrain Sunday.

According to word received late this afternoon from Bismarck, the first battalion of the North Dakota National Guard departed for Mercedes, Texas, shortly after 2 o'clock. The second battalion has been ordered to entrain about 8 o'clock tonight and the third at 10, all departing today.

When the word was received in camp that the start for the south would be made at once, the members of the guard became jubilant and packed their equipment in great haste, in order not to cause a delay.

St. Paul, Minn., July 22.—That a new series of bad forest fires are raging in the extreme northern section of the state is reported today to the state forest service. Two sections are under a heavy pall of smoke. The biggest fire is destroying buildings of the Virginia and Rainy Lake company north and east of Orr. Near Ray a crew of twenty-two men believed at noon that the fire would be controlled within a few hours.

Chicago, July 22.—Dr. William Ballentine, formerly professor of law in the universities of California and Wisconsin, was chosen dean of the law school of the University of Illinois by the trustees of the institution at a meeting here yesterday. He will succeed Dean C. K. Harker, who resigned two months ago.

Washington, July 22.—Vance McCormick, chairman of the Democratic national committee, conferred with President Wilson, senators and representatives, and other democratic leaders here on the campaign and the details of the plans for re-electing a Democratic house.

POLK COUNTY DAY AT FAIR

Grand Forks Fair to Have Special Day For Minnesotans.

Thursday, July 27th, has been designated as Polk county, Crookston and East Grand Forks day at the Grand Forks fair, and the people of the county are planning to attend in force on that date.

A large party of enthusiasts from the county seat are planning to auto down on that day, in reciprocity for the good attendance of Grand Forks people at the Crookston fair on Grand Forks and East Grand Forks Day. Many of the farmers in Western Polk county are also planning to be in attendance. It is probable also that the merchants of the East side will follow the lead of the largest mercantile establishment on the West side and close their places of business for at least a part of the day.

Thursday is one of the big days of Fair week, and the Minnesotans are sure to get their money's worth in their attendance.

Yesterday afternoon, Chief Albert Hurst and other officers of the police department, arrested three men on the charge of larceny, after a period of quiet investigation which has been going on since the time of the theft of several articles of clothing from Dr. W. C. Wilson's garage on Water street, about July 1.

The men arrested are Mike and John Miller, and one Taylor. The Miller brothers were apprehended on the Keystone farm, where they were working for Ed. Fried. Taylor was picked up on the streets of East Grand Forks.

At the time of the theft of the articles from Dr. Wilson's garage, no clew was left by the robbers. The police have made extensive search since that date, however, and yesterday Chief Hurst found a clew as to the identity of the three men who are now suspected of the crime. Yesterday morning at 11 o'clock the chief found several of the missing articles in a room in the basement of the building used by the Salvation Army. Upon inquiry he found that the men renting the room were working on the Keystone farm. The arrests followed immediately.

Not all of the stolen articles have been recovered. Two overcoats, two mackinaws and several miscellaneous articles were taken on the night of the theft. Only one overcoat and one mackinaw were found in the room yesterday.

The trial of the men was set for this afternoon. It is understood that they will enter a plea of not guilty, claiming that the articles found in the room, had been found by them and were not stolen.
