FOR MORE AND BETTER SILOS IN THE NORTHWEST

(Continued from Page 7.) should be set in the ground some 50 feet from the silo, and it is better that these posts are long enough so that the guy wires from the silo to the posts are in the ground.

These guy wires may be made by twisting two 1/2 inch steel wires together and some means should be provided for tightening them up occasionally as they become slack.

It is very essential that a good top be put on all silos and that the top of the silo be firmly held in place by cross braces so that they will not be wrecked by the action of the wind.

Other Types of Wood Silos. The silos for many types of good silos to be taken up in detail in these articles. One other type which can be easily built, and has given splendid satisfaction, is known as the Modified Wisconsin silo.

The foundation for this is built exactly the same as for the stave silo, except that the anchor bolts should be set so as not to have all the foundation, a circular sill which should be cut from 12's and nailed together so as to break joints.

After this sill is built and bolted in place, about a foot of good masonry should be built in the middle of the silo.

Medicore to common grassy killers comprised practically the whole representation on hand for yesterday's sale. The week's crop has produced a very small percentage of good to choice finished steers and their scarcity and the drop in rates has minimized the display of steers at \$9.25 to \$10.50 and practically prevented clearance of anything above \$7.00.

The \$5.75 to \$6.00 rates have applied to much of the ordinary to common steer stuff and inferior varieties are now salable even cheaper. The contingent of cows and heifers here yesterday had no better average qualifications than arrivals in this department earlier in the week and the stuff crossing the scales was sold mostly at \$5.00 to \$5.50 with few higher and cutters and canners trailing behind.

Fat bulls have had more or less support from outside competition during the week and have not eased off as much as the rank and file of butcher steers and cows but their status is somewhat weak.

Veal calves held about steady yesterday but a discount variously quoted earlier in the week has put a dollar on the heavier sorts and weiners remained effective. Tops have held at \$11.25 but sort has been closed.

Estimated receipts were 1,200 cattle and 900 calves against 1,319 cattle and 731 calves last Friday and 1,175 cattle and 520 calves a year ago.

After the door posts and studding are in place, resawed or half inch material bent and nailed on to the studding in the center of the silo should be taken to break joints as much as possible, so as not to have uneven bending.

After one course of sheathing is on a good quality of acid proof building paper should be put on, and another course of sheathing added.

It is well to use a little precaution, so that the studding kept located in nailing this last course of sheathing on, and also care should be taken to break joints between the boards as much as possible. It is perhaps more convenient to carry up the two courses at the same time, than to use one course at a time.

The door course should be made similar to those used on the upper ground silo, with bolts, as was previously specified.

After the sheathing is all on the inside of the silo, it is weather boarded outside with common lap siding. It may even be advisable to put on a second course of siding, and then building paper before the siding is applied.

Before the silo is filled it is advisable to apply a good coat of asphalt paint or tar, and it is well to coat the life of all silos to resist this every year before filling. This point of tarring and silo applies equally well to all makes of silos, and the timber were creosoted before it was put up, and even then this is no harm in applying the tar.

The silo should be filled with ground silo, will be covered in a succeeding article.
