He quietly opened the room door and was about to enter when he noticed that the bed which he expected to occupy already harbored a sleeper. The next room was also filled, and stealthy steps could be heard in other sections of the house.

When the creak of a door sounded through the gloomy halls, Carr became suspicious and within less than a moment, concluded that he was in the wrong house. A hasty retreat was made and even the clarinet was forgotten.

An alarm was sent in to the Grand Forks police station from North Seventh street, declaring that a strange woman was prowling through a residence and that she had dropped a clarinet in the room. Sleuths were placed on the trail and the owner of the instrument was discovered this morning, one block further up the street, worrying about the loss of his clarinet, but fearing arrest for house breaking.

### REV. BURLERSON HAS RESIGNED

#### Prominent local Pastor asks for Release on Oct. 31—Many Protests.

Rev. J. K. Burlerson, for the past 15 years pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal church, tendered his resignation at a meeting of the vestry, asking for his release on October 31. The action came as a big surprise to the members of the board and they decided to take the matter under advisement.

A promise made to his brother, Rev. Guy E. Burlerson, that he would care for the latter's two sons, in case anything should happen to the father, is given as the reason for his resignation. Rev. Guy Burlerson was drowned a few months ago, leaving a widow and his two little sons to mourn his loss.

He was formerly a pastor at Lakota, N. D., and because of the ill health of his wife, moved east where he has resided for a number of years. Because of climatic conditions, physicians declare that Mrs. Burlerson could not live in North Dakota.

In order to carry out the wish of his brother, Rev. Burlerson has decided to leave for the east. His resignation is being protested by his friends, who are making every protest in order to have him withdraw it.

He is a 33d degree Mason and has been prominent in the activities of this order. For the past several years he has been secretary of the Associated Churches and was instrumental in the success of this organization.

## BAN IS REMOVED FROM ONE FIRM

San Francisco, July 28.—The British government has suspended its trading with the enemy act blacklist against the firm of G. W. McNear, and the Petroleum Products company of San Francisco, of which McNear is the head, so far as delivery of goods under pending contracts is concerned, it was announced here today.

McNear said such assurance came from the British embassy at Washington through the state department and also from London following his protest of the action of the British government in placing the name of his firm on the recently issued blacklist of American firms.

Contracts pending, McNear said, would occur shipping facilities at his command for the remainder of the year.
