MANDAN WILL GET \$2,000,000 N. P. R. R. SHOPS

Authoritative Reports State That This City is Selected.

Mandan, N. D., Aug. 5.—Absolutely definite information has leaked out in thoroughly reliable circles, of the launching of a new enterprise by the Northern Pacific Railroad company which means a boom for Mandan such as no city in North Dakota ever experienced, namely the construction of a \$2,000,000 machine shop.

The whole N. P. system is now divided in three parts, served by the shops at Livingston, Tacoma, and Brainerd. A new district will be added which will be served by the shops at Mandan. This district probably will be composed of the whole Yellowstone and Dakota divisions.

The new \$2,000,000 shops will be the most modern in the entire northwest, will be larger than those at Tacoma, Brainerd or elsewhere on the Northern Pacific or any other system. The payroll will be increased at least \$75,000 a month.

Offices will be established here where men in charge will be ranked only by the general manager, and president's staff at St. Paul. The Northern Pacific land department is now dickering for the location of the new shops and in connection with this, it is stated that the course of the Heart river will be changed.

Several hundred men will be employed and there is no question but that the population of the city will be doubled. If the land can be secured it is highly probable that the construction work will be started this fall. It will positively be started early in the spring of 1917 at the latest.

It is definitely stated by one high railroad official that the machinery for the new shops has been partly ordered and will include the most modern equipment in the railroad business. The plans have all been completed.

There is no question about the reliability of the above report. It comes indirectly from President Hannafoord, and from a dozen different sources in connection with the chief officers of the system.

AFTERMATH OF NEW YORK'S EXPLOSION

New York, Aug. 4.—In connection with the recent munitions explosion on Black Tom island a miraculous escape is recorded. Peter Raceta, captain of a Morgan lighter, was asleep in his cabin when the fire was discovered and his boat was towed away from the burning piers of Black Tom island. When about fifty feet from the Statue of Liberty in New York bay there came the great explosion.

The captain describes himself as having been thrown into the water straight from his bunk. He started swimming and found himself under one of the burning docks with flaming vessels, cars and buildings around him. He swam across the water to
