AGGIES NEGOTIATING WITH MICHIGAN AGGIES FOR GAME OF FOOTBALL DURING FALL

Fargo, N. D., Aug. 9.—With six regulars, two recruits from other schools and half a dozen high school stars of last year, Coach Davis of the A. C. will start training for the coming football season at Little Pine lake September 10.

School opens September 18 and the aggie coach expects to have put in a week of hard training by that time.

Although the big coach loses six of his best men off last year's team he is still optimistic about the coming gridiron season. Among the regulars who

will appear on the field this fall are: Bjornson, captain of last year's team; Movold, the speedy little quarterback; and Carlson, Ross and Shinn off the line.

Will Captain Nemzek Return? Will Captain Nemzek return is a big question among the A. C. students at present. Coach Davis thinks he will. The big fullback is now at the border with Co. B and strenuous efforts are being made to obtain his release for the coming school year.

Several players from the Minnesota

U team have already been released and the release of the aggie captain is expected. The return of big Captain "Slim" will greatly strengthen the aggie backfield which without his return would leave only Movold there from the last year's team.

Try to Get Brown Out. The release of Brown of the N. D. U. from border service is also being sought. Brown is one of the university's greatest ground gainers.

The loss of Rolinger, McQuillan and Catlin, three stars of the backfield, will hit the aggie hard, but the loss of Kelly, star center and tackle, will probably be felt most. Crawford off end and Amot off the line will leave bad holes for Davis to fill.

Among the men who will compete for places this fall are Anderson from the Wahpeton scene, one of the strongest men from the southern part of the state; "Dutch" Hauser of Bismarck, last year's basketball center and a star end on the Bismarck high team.

"Happy" Peterson is expected to return this fall and his presence will greatly help fill up the vacancies in the backfield or at end. "Happy" has made a record for himself here and he will be warmly welcomed by the A. C. boosters.

Big Lakota Freshman. John Dismore, a big freshman from Lakota, will also bring an argument for a place somewhere about the team. Dismore was seen here in the high school track meet last spring and he looks like a comer.

Three Moorhead high school graduates will also appear in uniform when the call is given and will give their upper classmates a hard run for places. They are Bill Nemzek, Melvey and Curran, all stars on last year's backfield.

Several others have also expressed their intention of joining, but the coach is not figuring on anyone until he sees him in a uniform making good.

Michigan Aggies October 28. The schedule is out and there is hope of seeing the Michigan aggies here in action October 28. Michigan is willing to play either place but financial difficulties are hindering the assurance of bringing them here.

Coach Davis is putting forth every effort possible to bring the Michigan school to North Dakota and should he be successful Fargo and North Dakota will probably see one of the greatest games played here in years.

The A. C. plays the two first games of the season at home and possibly the fourth if the coach is successful in booking the Michigan team to play here. The home team is with Fargo college at the A. C.

LOCAL PLAYERS TO ENTER MEET

Wilkinson and Bristol Will Take Part in Tennis Tournament.

Circumstances will prevent Grand Forks having as large a representation at the annual state tennis tournament which will be held in Fargo beginning the 14th of this month. At present but two players are known to have entered. They are Dr. L. D. Bristol, who took part here last year for the first time and made an excellent showing after having been out of the game some time, and J. W. Wilkinson.

For the first tournament in a good many years the Elton brothers will not be seen in play. T. B. Elton, the older of the two, has not been able to get into condition because of business, while Wilbur is a corporal in M company now with the North Dakota regiment on the border. The brothers have twice held the state doubles championship.

WILLISTON WINS THE STATE CHAMPIONSHIP FROM THE CANDO TEAM

(Herald Special Service.) Williston, N. D., Aug. 9.—Williston won the independent baseball championship of North Dakota and eastern Montana yesterday by defeating the Cando White Sox in the third straight game of the five game series for the state title by the score 4 to 0.

Well timed hits and a costly error in the visitors' infield gave the game to the locals.

Marshall, who was on the mound for the "Opportunes," allowed only three hits, and except in the fifth inning when the bases were full with only one out, the visitors never threatened to score. In their half of the same inning Williston got two runners on bases and a well placed three-bagger by Warner brought in two scores.

The series for the state championship has been one of the most closely contested played in the northwest this season. Cando, who led their stride in the second game 4 to 2; 3 to 1, and 4 to 0, in the fifth game will be played off tomorrow. The "Opportunes" backed by the local fans, stand ready to defend their title as state champions against all comers. Unless arrangements for games are made, however, the local team will disband following a series with the Plentywood, Mont., team, at Plentywood next week.


