WORK STARTED ON NEW LIGHT PLANT

Jamestown, N. D., Aug. 11.—Work was started here yesterday on the erection of the new \$48,000 plant for the Western Electric company on the site secured at the corner of Main street and Third avenue south. A two-story brick structure with a face of 148 feet on Main street and 76 feet on Third avenue will be erected as the company's new home. An extension of the Midland railway company's tracks will be made to the plant so that fuel may be placed in the bins directly from the cars. A thousand tons of coal will be the capacity of the big bins. The engines and dynamos will be placed this coming winter and early next season the change will be made from a direct to an alternating current.

HOSPITAL WILL BE SOLD SOON

Commissioners Decide That Disposal of Property is Best for County.

Minot, N. D., Aug. 11.—The county commissioners have decided to offer St. Joseph's hospital and nurses' home for sale. The commissioners believe it will be for the best interests of the county to do this and have accordingly adopted a resolution providing for the advertising of bids for the property.

The property consists of a two-story and basement brick structure located just south of the court house property. There are six public wards, each sufficiently large to accommodate five and six beds, and provided with all modern equipment. There are eight private rooms in the building, all modern and up to date. There is an operating room, fully equipped and ample for such work. The auxiliary portions of the building are ample. These include the kitchen, laundry and twelve rooms for nurses, together with the other arts of a hospital which are essential in its successful operation.

HEIRS CANNOT BE FOUND IN COUNTRY

Fargo, N. D., Aug. 11.—Heirs of Azariah L. Larson, who died in Moorhead in 1883, and of his wife, who died in Rochester, Minn., 15 years later, stand to profit from an estate worth about \$5,000 if they can be located. The administrator of the estate declared in probate court today his intention of closing the estate if the heirs cannot be found—in which event the property will revert to the state.

MEN CAN RETURN TO WORK AT FULL PAY

Fergus Falls, Minn., Aug. 11.—Men employed in the state construction work near Pelican Rapids near here, have an opportunity to return to their posts without losing pay for the time they have been off, if they return to work at once. It appears, quit their jobs through dissatisfaction with the meals furnished them—being satisfied with wages offered by the county option act.

SEVERAL FINED FOR SELLING BOOZE

to all parts of the skull as they do in mammoths and modern elephants. Furthermore, they are wanting altogether in all portions of the symgomatic arch.

The articulated forelimb of this creature indicates an animal little more than seven feet in height, half that of a large mammoth. The vertebrae seem large out of all proportion, being equal in size to those of the mammoth. This new species of tetrabelodon was short legged, broad hipped, heavily bodied and perhaps semi-aquatic in habit. Its body must have dragged close to the ground, adds Prof. Barbour, not unlike the short legged rhinoceros of the present day.

The jaw is that of an adult, but not an aged individual, as is indicated by the number and condition of the teeth, which slant backward and inward. The low structure of the cresture, seven feet, and the long jaw, five feet, made it easy to reach the ground with the lower jaws. It was a grotesque head on a protruding body. A conjectural restoration of the head drawn in outline appears in the American Journal of Science.

Any A. Barnes, plaintiff vs William H. Hulet, defendant.

Syllabus: Both parties appeal. Trial de novo demanded by defendant and partial reversal by plaintiff. Reformation of a written contract. Rescission of a written contract. Fraud, and forfeiture for alleged fraud of defendant, and forfeiture for his de-

faults under the contract, are sought by plaintiff. Defendant asks that title of the land in suit be quieted in him, on condition.

Held: There was no fraud practiced upon plaintiff, including her to make the contract for sale of the land to defendant.

(1) Possession in defendant was contemplated by the contract.

(2) There was no abandonment by defendant of the contract or premises.

(3) Plaintiff is not entitled to forfeiture.

(4) Plaintiff should not recover an annual rental of \$100 and interest thereon for defendants possession of the premises.

(5) In lieu of rental allowed by the judgment, plaintiff should recover only interest at 7 per cent annum on the \$1,100 balance due on contract from the date of deposit made with the clerk.

(7) Balance of deposit over \$2,370 and interest and costs for trial, less fees basis costs on this appeal, ordered returned to defendant, in whom also title is quieted to the half acre in dispute.

From a decree of the District Court of Kansas County, Allen, Judge. Both parties appeal. Modified and judgment directed.
