WHEN REGRET COMES TOO LATE. An Englishman now resident in North Dakota has given in conversation with The Herald an outline of certain experiences of his own which furnish an impressive lesson to Americans just now.

WHEAT PRICES AND SPECULATION. Wheat prices are high, and the market is nervous and excitable. This year North America, which has usually contributed a very considerable share of the wheat consumed by the importing countries, will have little for export.

THE MEXICAN CONFERENCE. An agreement has been reached between the United States and Mexico on the creation of a commission to consider matters pertaining to the relations between the two countries.

Unless the discussions are more inclusive than suggested by Carranza they will be futile. American troops cannot be withdrawn from Mexico until the conditions in Mexican territory there will be no reason to fear a repetition of the outrages which made their use necessary.

PROTECTION AND THE CONSTITUTION. The reluctance of the Democratic party to let go of the theories of the past, in the face of the known facts of the present, has never been shown more clearly than in the attitude of the party with reference to the tariff.

The man who speculates in anything when he cannot afford to lose is a fool. The man of means who chooses to risk some of his loose change in a flyer on the wheat market, or in a gold mine, or in any other speculative manner, is running no risk of improving himself or wronging his creditors.
