Farmers Gather From all Parts of Country to Attend Big Meeting.

Hillsboro, N. D., Aug. 12.—A goodly number of representative farmers from the various sections of the county assembled in the city Saturday to attend the drainage and clover convention.

There were a number of good talks made on the subjects under which the meeting was called for. Supt. J. G. Haney of the Grand Forks Experimental Farm of the International Harvester company, gave a splendid discussion of the benefits of raising alfalfa, clover and sweet clover.

Judge Pollock was also present and took part in the discussions on both subjects.

During the noon recess those in attendance were given an opportunity to inspect the Murray drain, west of the city, autos being provided for the occasion by Hillsboro citizens and many took advantage of it.

As a result of the meeting a system of drainage to be worked out on a basis providing adequate service for every portion of the county was endorsed.
