

EXPECT RELEASE FOR STUDENTS

Guards Who Desire to Enter University Will be Allowed to Return.

That the militia boys of North Dakota who desire to attend the schools and colleges of the state during the fall term will be permitted to do so unless additional trouble with Mexico

is experienced within the next few weeks, was made known here when a communication was received by President McVey of the university in response to his letter to the war department, urging that the boys be allowed to return to school. President McVey wrote the war department some time ago asking that the guards who desire to attend school be allowed to do so, if such a thing was possible. As there seems to be no indication of additional trouble with Mexico, it is expected that his request will be complied with and that the North Dakota boys will be allowed to return provided application is made through the proper channels. Should the boys return for the beginning of school, it will mean that the 48 students of various schools in the state undoubtedly will return while it is expected that a large number of men who contemplated attending higher institutions of learning also will come back.

Grand Forks high school and the University of North Dakota will be greatly benefited should the boys return, as it will mean that a number of good football players will be back for both schools. Besides this there are men in the militia who will be missed greatly in schools and colleges in other cities. Governor L. B. Hanna and Colonel J. F. Fraine have expressed themselves as being very much in favor of the plan for the return of the boys and will do everything to help the movement. Following is a text of the communication received by President McVey from the war department at Washington: "Commanders are authorized to discharge as soon as practicable after September 1, national guardsmen mustered into the United States service, who can show bona fide intentions of entering or re-entering schools or colleges at the beginning of the fall term 1916, unless the military situation at the time shall be such as to render their retention in the service necessary."

MAY ARREST MAN FOR DESERTION

Await call from Army Headquarters then Leaves for this State—Not Found.

Madison, Wis., Aug. 14.—The words of that old Salvation Army song, "Where is My Wandering Boy Tonight?" possess a more than usual significance to Mrs. Mary Sorstad of this city, whose son, Anton, on the reserve list of the United States army, went away to work in the harvest fields of North Dakota three weeks ago and although innocent, is in danger of being arrested for desertion. A short time ago, Anton, who is 30 years old, returned to his old home in Madison after serving three years with the Fourth United States cavalry, which is stationed at Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands. He had always been proud of his army experience and was awaiting impatiently for the call which would bring him from the reserve and back with the colors. He was working on the state capitol building as a stone-cutter.

The Mexican trouble came and every day Sorstad was expecting the call which should order him to rejoin his command. None came. The lure of the large wages paid in the Dakota wheat fields called him and three weeks ago he left his mother and started for the west. Since that time she has heard nothing from him. Then the order came from army headquarters in Chicago for Anton to rejoin his troop. His mother did not know where he was and wrote back to that effect. The letters from Chicago became brusque and hinted that she knew more concerning the whereabouts of her boy than she would disclose. Intimations were made that if the government had to look him up, an arrest for desertion would follow which would send him to Leavenworth in disgrace. "I know he would come back if he only knew, for he loved the army," his mother said fearfully. "The only thing I do know is that he is somewhere in North Dakota working in the harvest fields."

GUARDSMEN GIVEN IDENTIFICATION TAGS FOR NECK

(By Staff Correspondent.) Mercedes, Tex., Aug. 14.—Identification tags were distributed today among the soldiers of the First North Dakota infantry regiment. The tags, bearing the name, rank and company of the owner, are hung about the necks of each of the soldiers. In case of casualties they would serve to facilitate the identification of those fallen in battle. As a further means of beautifying the North Dakota camp, banana trees have been planted along the streets in front of the officers' quarters and before the tents of some industrious squads. Sergeant Major Oscar Truman of the Third battalion captured a large tarantula and after placing it in a bottle of alcohol shipped it to one of the banks at Grafton, where it will be displayed in the window. Sergeant Herbert Metzger of Company M caught a big tarantula and a scorpion and he is also planning to send these home as a curiosity. Many of the boys are collecting bugs and reptiles of all kinds and sending them to "the folk back home."

WATCHMAKER INJURED. Bicycle Rider Hurled to Pavements at Corner of Kittson Avenue and Fifth Street. Grover Bogenrief watchmaker for the A. E. Palmer Jewelry company, was painfully injured last Saturday evening when an automobile, whirling around the corner of Kittson avenue and Fifth street, plucked into the bicycle he was riding, throwing him forcibly to the pavement. Bogenrief received several painful cuts and bruises, but his injuries were not serious. He was taken to the office of a local physician in an automobile.

NEW DRUG STORE FOR PORTAL, N. D. (Herald Special Service.) Portal, N. D., Aug. 14.—M. Reite, whose drug store and stock was completely destroyed here by fire recently, is beginning the erection of a brick structure, 45 by 70 feet, which will contain a drug store, ice cream parlor. The second floor will be used as an opera hall and will be equipped with accommodations traveling shows. Portal has been without a drug store for a number of years and a new one of the above dimensions will be the means of affording added pleasure to local residents. The new brick building will add greatly to the appearance of one of the principal business streets and replaces one of the few remaining wooden structures within the city limits.

BATHGATE WOMAN CALLED BY DEATH Bathgate, N. D., Aug. 14.—Mrs. J. A. Anderson passed away, succumbing to a prolonged illness which had kept her practically confined to her bed for the past eight months. Death was not unexpected at the time as Mrs. Anderson had been sinking rapidly. The deceased had suffered for a number of years from a complication of ailments which gradually developed into a state of general disability being unable to attend to but a small portion of the household duties for some time. Funeral services were held in the Baptist church of this place and conducted by Rev. Stump of Cavalier. The remains were laid to rest in the Hamilton cemetery. Two children, Clarence C. Anderson and Cora A. Anderson, besides the husband, remain to mourn her loss. Mr. Anderson and family have the sincere sympathy of the friends and neighbors in this, their time of sorrow.

CHARGES THAT FEES HAVE NOT BEEN PAID Grafton, N. D., Aug. 14.—Charges that county records fail to disclose payments to the county by G. M. Fraser, auditor of the county for 25 years, of certain fees collected by him, have been filed with the county commission by W. C. Treumann, present auditor, who defeated Fraser in the last election.
