Wins Five and Ten Mile Events at Races There Sunday Afternoon.

FARGO COLLEGE HAS NEW COACH

Wabash College Star Will Lead Hill School Coming Season.

Fargo, N. D., Aug. 14.—Mr. E. O. Brown of Winona Lake, Ind., has been selected as football coach of Fargo college for the coming year. Coach Brown is a graduate of Wabash college, Indiana, where he was a star player in every branch of college sports, having played football, basketball, baseball and still holds the Indiana record for the shot-put and discus.

Brown is known as one of the shrewdest coaches ever produced by an Indiana school. He has coached Kewanee, Ill., high school, Parsons college and Bethany college, Kansas. His success as a coach in the latter school is widely known and his coming to Fargo college will be welcome news to the students on the hill.

Arrives About Sept. 10. Coach Brown is expected to arrive about Sept. 10 and will begin looking up his material for the coming football season at once.

Football prospects look good at the college and with a man of Coach Brown's reputation the wheel the hill bunch should have a successful season.

Captain Holmes, last year's right half on the Fargo team and one of North Dakota's fastest backfield players, is not back as he is going to Minnesota university to study medicine this year. Carpenter and Boies, both star veterans on the high school team, will not be back as they are graduated. The loss of these men leaves a big hole for Coach Brown to fill.

Six regulars and four "subs" of last year's team are expected to make a place in the new team. The wheel the hill men will answer to the new coach's call for recruits for the gridiron.

"Stub" Overby Back. Others returning this fall are "Stub" Overby, Fargo's plucky little quarterback; Sam and the wheel the hill end, both stars at their respective positions. They will be looked to to lead the new members down this season.

Corbett, Berg and Goslee, three of last year's linemen, are on the lineup again. Monson, last year's "sub" quarterback, is expected to make a place somewhere in the backfield this season.

The first race will be a twenty-mile event, the second call for fifty miles, and the third and last race is for 100 miles. A request has been made of the contest board of the American Automobile association to make the 100-mile race a championship event. The date for the race originally was September 4, but the opening of the Cincinnati speedway on that date caused the time to be changed. All entries must be made by September 5. A large crowd is expected because the race comes at the close of the State Fair.

South Bend, Ind.—Ninety-six horses have been entered to date in the four \$1,000 stake events of the Interstate Fair Racing association program for the races here during fair week, September 12 to 16. More than 200 entries have been promised for sixteen races over the program. The entries this year are said to be heavier and better than ever before in the history of northern Indiana and southern Michigan fairs.

HEAVY HITTING MARKS SEASON

Stars of Big Leagues are Driving Out Extra Base Hits.

New York, Aug. 14.—Heavy extra base hitting among the leading batters of the big leagues has been a prominent feature of the present season. Notwithstanding the fact that a considerable percentage of the scheduled games to date have been postponed, the leaders in the extra base hit division are close to, if they have not already equaled, the figures made for the entire playing period of 1915.

The latest compilations show that in the American league, Graney, of Cleveland, leads in two base drives with a total of 24 whereas he collected but twenty during the entire season a year ago. Joe Jackson, of Chicago, is second with twenty which just equals his record for the whole of the previous season. Tris Speaker, of Cleveland, is still six doubles behind his 1915 figures and Ty Cobb of Detroit is a little better than half way toward his total of last year.

None of the leaders in the three-base hit division has as yet surpassed last season's record but several are close to their total for twelve months ago. Cleveland's Veach, of Detroit and Pipp of New York are all tied with eight triples which is more than 75 percent of their 1915 collection. Baker of New York leads in home runs with seven, which is but one less than he made during the entire 1914 season while a member of the Athletics. Pipp of the same club has already equaled his record of last season and Graney of Cleveland is ahead with Ruth, of Boston, and Fournier, of Chicago, within a drive of their figures of a year ago.

Several of the National league heavy hitters are ahead of last season's totals in this department of the game and others are rapidly approaching the point where they will be able to pass the 1915 aggregate. Among the leading two base sluggers, Stock of Philadelphia, alone has eclipsed the total made during the pennant race of twelve months ago. Groh, of Cincinnati, has rapped out nine triples to date, which just equals his mark last season. Seacher of St. Louis; Williams of Chicago; Myers of Brooklyn and Betzel of St. Louis are all ahead of their 1915 totals. In the home run class the leading trio have yet to reach the marks for the entire playing period of last year, but Merkle of New York; Smith of St. Louis; Zimmerman and Schulte of Chicago, and Carey of Pittsburgh have passed their best efforts of the previous season.
