HUGHES ON THE PHILIPPINES.

The position which is taken by Mr. Hughes on the Philippine question is that which is set forth in the Republican platform, and is in direct opposition to that taken by the Democrats.

Those who have made this recommendation, however, have assumed a responsibility which should be quite clearly understood. The advice given has, for the moment, at least, had a stiffening effect on the northwestern market.


But, important though these things are, they are trivial in comparison with the interests of the general public which are now at stake.

Congress has made some slight provision for the settlement of disputes such as this without resort to the strike. But the provisions are

to interrupt the transportation and we interrupt everything. And the vital interests of the whole nation are of more importance than the immediate interests of any group.

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LINCOLN LOG CABIN WILL BE ACCEPTED BY PRESIDENT WILSON SEPTEMBER 4

Louisville, Aug. 18.—When President Wilson comes to Hodgenville, Laure county, Kentucky, on September 4 to accept in the name of the people of the United States the Lincoln farm and Lincoln memorial hall, which contains the log cabin in which the great emancipator was born, he will be the third chief executive of the nation to pay homage at this national shrine.

With the president will come a number of United States senators, congressmen and public officials who have taken an active interest in preserving the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln.

Senator John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi, is on the program for an address on "Abraham Lincoln and the South." Robert J. Collier, the New York publisher, chairman of the executive committee of the Lincoln Farm association, will formally present the deed to the Lincoln farm to the nation.
