CRAWFORD IS THE SINGLES CHAMP AGAIN

Willson Forfeits His Chances by Not Appearing on the Courts.

Match Set for 9:30—St. Paul Man Wanted to Play at 2:30 P. M.

(Herald Special Service.) Fargo, N. D., Aug. 18.—Charles Crawford of Fargo, today retained the title as state tennis champion, when the final match, between himself and Fred Willson of St. Paul, was declared forfeited by Willson to Crawford.

Willson's failure to appear at Island Park courts, where the tourney is being staged, resulted in Referee Woledge declaring the match forfeited, action being ratified by unanimous approval of the executive committee.

Set for 9:30 o'clock this morning, at conference of finalists with the referee yesterday afternoon, Willson, several hours later in the evening, informed Mr. Woledge that he did not want to play until 2:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Because of other matches that Crawford is playing in, particularly the state and valley doubles, which are on for today, Willson was informed that the change in the hour could not be sanctioned, and that the championship would be forfeited to Crawford in event that he did not appear at 9:30 o'clock.

Willson had no other matches today having dropped out of Red River valley open event yesterday. Crawford Jayne and Stielwagen, Mill City players, will meet tomorrow morning in the final of the Red River valley singles event.

Jayne reached the finals this morning when, after losing the first set to Bright, of South Dakota, 6-2, latter was forced to abandon play. He was taken ill while on the courts Wednesday, the white heat putting him out.

MAD DOG SHOT THIS MORNING Animal Believed to be Afflicted with Hydrophobia, Killed by Officer.

Officer Wyman this morning shot a dog believed to be afflicted with hydrophobia. The animal was causing a disturbance near the DeMers avenue bridge and the patrolman was notified, and made an investigation. In order to prevent any serious results, the canine was killed, as it appeared to be mad and fear was entertained by the business men of that section of the city that it would go on a rampage.

Health Officer Treacy conducted an investigation and reported that the animal's condition was undoubtedly due to the heat and flea combined. As the dog was killed shortly after it was discovered to be in an abnormal condition, it is not believed that any other dogs were bitten. Conducted a stringent campaign to prevent dogs from running at large, and those that have not been taxed, have been taken to the city pound and killed. During the excessive hot weather, many dogs have been afflicted with distemper, and unless efforts are made to prevent canines from running at large, fear has been expressed that an epidemic of hydrophobia may result.

PLANS COMPLETED FOR BENEFIT SALE Members of Soldiers' Aid Society Met This Afternoon—Women to Be in Charge of Sales.

Plans for the sale to be held tomorrow at Odell's store, to be conducted by the Soldiers' Aid society of this city were completed at a meeting held this afternoon.
