Deep Sea Divers Fear Bremen Is Lost; New Hole in Sunken Steamer May Tell the Story

Lewes, Del., Aug. 18.—The Bremen may dock and the Deutschland may reach the other side without mishap, but until both are reported safe, the deep sea divers and shipping men who use Cape Henlopen as a base believe one or the other has sunk with all its crew off Cape Henlopen.

Nor is their reason for believing the disaster has occurred in the least fanciful. Here it is, made clear for the landman: Fourteen miles off Cape Henlopen is anchored the Fenwick Island light ship, and within short distance of it is the sunken wreck of the steamship Washington, formerly in the service of the American-Hawaiian line. On August 26, 1915, the big sugar laden freighter was rammed by the large five masted schooner Elizabeth Palmer and foundered in a few minutes.

Some months ago it was determined to try to refloat the Washington, and a preliminary survey made by divers at the time disclosed the exact position of the wreck and that she would occupy a square of water 100 feet long and 30 feet wide. This left her port side up, almost and reaching nearly the surface. In other words, the water level there is a clearance of 37 feet between the upturned side and the sea surface.

At first it was thought that one of the derelict destroyers of the coast guard had made an attempt to blow up the Cpna inquiry, but this proved not to be the case. The wreck is not unlike that which might be made by an overload charge of dynamite. The hull is crushed and the ship's frame is being plied and ripped apart. The only plausible explanation is that the sunken Washingtonian was struck by another vessel directly over her.
