Much work remains to be done, and unless better weather conditions ensue, it is doubtful as to whether or not the construction work will be completed this fall.

Efforts will be made to have the entire structure finished before the swimming season next summer.

GENERAL RAIN FELL IN RED RIVER VALLEY

Drizzle Begins at Early Hour This Morning and Continues all Forenoon—General in Valley.

Grand Forks awoke this morning to find a gentle rain falling—and rolled over to sleep some more. Farmers who were out in the fields, the fact stayed awake to say a few things, for the rain at this time is not likely to help any crops in this section and is sure to retard harvesting and threshing.

Small grains are at present so far advanced that moisture at this time will not help to fill the heads. It is likely to stimulate corn to increased growth of foliage and thus retard the maturity of the ears.

ARBITRATION OF OTHERS TO BE INCLUDED

but it has arisen. Some means must be found to prevent its recurrence but no means can be found off-hand or in a hurry or in season to meet the present national emergency. What I am proposing does not weaken or discredit the principle of arbitration. It strengthens it, rather. It proposes that nothing be conceded except the eight hour day to which the whole economic movement of the time seems to point and the immediate creation of an agency for determining all the arbitrable elements in this case in the light of not predictions or forecasts but of established and ascertained facts. It is the first step of the direct road to the discovery of the best permanent basis for arbitration when other means than those now available are exhausted.

CROPS IN SOUTH DAKOTA ARE POOR

A. E. Watson, local abstractor, accompanied by his wife and child, returned this morning from points in South Dakota where they have spent the past two weeks on a combined business and pleasure trip.

While in South Dakota they visited at Aberdeen, Watertown and other principal cities of that state. Mr. Watson claims that the condition of the crops in that section of the country is not any better than in North Dakota and that very little threshing has been done. The rainfall has been heavy, claims Mr. Watson, and as a result the crops are exceedingly poor.

LAND BANK BOARD IN FARGO SEPT. 3

Washington, Aug. 21.—A hearing of great importance to farmers, farm organizations and cities of North Dakota will be conducted by the newly appointed federal farm loan board in the federal building at Fargo, N. D., on Sept. 3. This hearing is to secure information to guide the board in determining the boundaries of the 12 federal land bank districts into which the United States is to be divided for the application of the new rural credit legislation.

The members of the federal loan board who will conduct the hearing are Hon. Wm. G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury; Geo. W. Norris, farm loan commissioner; Herbert Quick, Capt. W. S. A. Smith and C. E. Lobb.
