Reno, Nev., Aug. 29.—Philander C. Knox, Jr., son and namesake of the former secretary of state, has been living here in the most retired manner to establish a legal residence.

"I am here to get a divorce," said Mr. Knox. "My suit will be filed on November 25 next. My wife deserted me, and that is the ground on which I shall apply for divorce. I expect my wife will contest the suit. I expect also to make my home in Nevada and to go to business here."

"I refuse to say any more about my intentions. I know where my wife is, and she will be served with a copy of the summons in proper time."

Young Knox has arranged to take apartments in the Reno Y. M. C. A. building, and is in close touch with leading Republican politicians. He says he will take a small part in the Republican campaign in Nevada. Cole L. Harwood is his attorney.

Young Mr. Knox eloped from Providence, R. I., with Miss May G. Bolter in 1910. She was about twenty and it was reported, had been a salesgirl in a New York department store. She left there in 1915, and was quoted as saying in an interview:

"It was impossible for me to make my marriage with 'Tip' a success. I left him when we were in Charleston, S. C., a few days ago. Since I have been in New York detectives have been watching me, I am certain."
