No one witnessed the accident and it was some time later that the mangled remains of the aged man was found.

ALLEGED SPY FOUND WITH U. S. WAR MAPS

New York, Sept. 5.—Disclosures that may reveal a sensational international plot to steal military secrets of the United States are expected to follow the recovery in Baltimore of eight original maps prepared for the navy department and alleged to have been stolen from an officer of the coastguard service. The maps were recovered by the police in a furnished room in Baltimore, which they declared recently has been occupied by Herbert Sauer, a deserter from the coastguards, and now a prisoner in the Tombs in connection with the mysterious death of Mrs. Caroline Barker Aug. 25, in her apartment at 515 West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

Confronted today with the stolen maps, admitted by the federal authorities to be of the utmost military importance and accused of being a German spy Sauer refused to say how he came into possession of them and much other property the police declare was stolen from Lieut. 
