SCHOOL-BOY IS SENSATION OF NATIONAL PLAY

Jones is Still in Line for Golf Championship—Playing Strong.

Gardner and Evans Loom up as the Big Contenders For the Title.

Philadelphia, Sept. 7.—At the end of the second round of the match play in the National Amateur tournament at the Merion Cricket club course yesterday, Evans and Gardner of Chicago loomed up big for the title.

School-boy Jones of Atlanta, Gulleford of Boston and White of Flushing shared the limelight with Evans and Gardner. White's elimination of Kirkby, Englewood, after the latter drove his second into the clubhouse piazza at the home green, and Jones' win over Dyer were upsets of the day.

Jones is the sensation of the tournament. The southern youngster worked his way into the third round today by defeating Frank W. Dyer, the Pennsylvania state champion, four up and two to play.

To Overcome Lead. In order to win young Jones had to overcome a lead of four holes, gained in the first six played. He did this by coming home in 34 strokes, despite a six on the eighteenth, an easy par four hole.

The champion, Robert Gardner, won fairly easily over Max Marston, the crack New York player, 5 and 3. He had Marston five down after the morning round and Marston was unable to pick up any holes in the afternoon.

Chick Evans had it easy with W. H. Smith of Pine Valley. He tried many experiments on the course after he had the match well in hand and said last night that he feels now fully acquainted with it and ready for the great finish which is sure to come.

Jesse Gulleford, the Massachusetts champion, after playing indifferent golf in the morning and landing all even with G. A. Ormiston of Pittsburgh, on the eighteenth green, went out in the afternoon and won by six and five.

Perry Adair, the other Atlanta youth, who has done so well in this championship, could not stand the pace and gave to D. C. Corkran of Baltimore in the afternoon, after playing him fairly even in the morning.

Low scoring was the rule. Evans took but 73 shots in the morning round. Other good rounds were made by C. B. Buxton, 75; Gardner, 76; Small, 76; Anderson, 78; and Smith, 77. No players went over 85 in the morning.

North Dakota Aggies Face Heaviest Schedule With a Number of Best Men Lost

Coach Davis Must Depend on Unknown Freshmen to Fill Holes Left by Graduation and Absence of Guard—Michigan Aggies are on the Card.

(Herald Special Service.) Fargo, N. D., Sept. 7.—Carded for eight games, including the Michigan Aggies at Lansing, Mich., on October 23, the North Dakota Aggies, minus such stars as McQuillan, Bolsinger, Kelly, Crawford and Aamodt, begin practice next Tuesday. Coach Paul Davis today issuing the call to his squad of new men. They will work out a week before the opening of school, when members of last year's team who are available again for football this season, will report.

Coach Davis looks to a group of ten to fifteen high school men who come to the college this year, for material to fill the great holes in his lineup, caused by graduation of his last year's stars.

Heaviest Schedule. The Aggies schedule is one of the heaviest ever attempted, several changes being made since it was announced last summer. These include the change of the date for the Fargo college game to Thursday, November 16, instead of October 28, that date being given to the Michigan Aggies.

The South Dakota state college, which was originally listed for November 18, will not be played. Jamestown college has been added to the list, the first game of the season to be played against that college at Jamestown, September 29.

The card, as announced today, follows: September 29, Jamestown college at Jamestown. October 7, Wahpeton Science school, at Fargo. October 14, St. Thomas college, at Fargo.

October 21, Hamline university, at Fargo. October 28, Michigan Aggies, at Lansing, Mich. November 4, University of North Dakota, at Grand Forks.

November 11, Dakota Wesleyan, at Mitchell, S. D. November 18, Fargo college. Nemzek on Border.

Recruits whom Davis has ordered to report here Sept. 12 include the following: Louis Anderson, Wahpeton, fell back on Wahpeton Science school, center of Wahpeton basketball team, and catcher of that school's baseball team. Anderson is at the Mexican border, and may not be able to report.

John Dismore, Lakota, a 210 pound youngster who made a good record with the Lakota high school; Leon Haynes, Minot, all state high school basketball forward last season, and halfback in football; W. L. Williams, halfback, and pitcher, fell back, both of Devils Lake high school; Baker played at four four years.

Bill Nemzek, of Moorhead, a brother of Captain Nemzek, enters school this fall, and has played full with the Moorhead high school. He is the fourth member of the Nemzek family to enter the state A. C. He will report with the rest. "Dutch" Hauser, center for the A. C. basketball team last year, goes in for football this year. Hauser entered college last January, made the first basketball team, and his record of 96 goals in 18 games proved his worth.

Sherman, Nichols, both star basketball and football men, of Minot, will report. Kelly, a LaCrosse, Wis., young man, who played half with the LaCrosse high school last season, enters the A. C. this fall. Gratton, Rourke, Lisbon, quarter of the Lisbon high school squad, is another new man. Barton Wilson, of Sac City, Iowa, a 180 pounder, with a fine sprinting record, comes to the college this year.

MILL CITY BOAT GETS MILE RACE

Miss Minneapolis Captures Lake George Cup and Championship.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 7.—The Lake George cup emblematic of the one-mile powerboat championship of North America, was won yesterday by Miss Minneapolis of the Minneapolis Powerboat association. Miss Detroit of Detroit was the only other starter, mishaps causing the withdrawal of Peter Pan VII of the Columbia Yacht club, New York, and Hawkeys of the Lake George club.

Miss Minneapolis' average speed in six one-mile trials was 53.11 nautical or 61.98 statute miles an hour and her fastest nautical mile was in one minute, four and six-tenths seconds, which she made in her first mile, running with the current.

Miss Detroit averaged 45.45 nautical or 52.37 statute miles an hour and her fastest nautical mile was one minute, sixteen and six-tenths second made with the current in her third mile.

Last year's average speed for the cup was 53.87 statute miles an hour. Hawkeys had a hole stove in her hull by driftwood and was towed into her dock, Peter Pan VII was shipped home by the race because of a bent camshaft.

Presentation to the representatives of the Miss Minneapolis of the gold trophy was made yesterday and the Lake George cup, will be made at a banquet of powerboat men tonight.
