OFFICIALS NAB E. W. BENTZ FOR LAW AUTO THEFT

Will Face Several Charges in West Before Brought Here.

Letter Asking That Charge Be Dropped, is Written to Physician.

E. W. Bentz, formerly a resident of East Grand Forks and widely known throughout this section of the northwest, was arrested at Tacoma, Wash., last Saturday evening, according to information received by Sheriff A. F. Turner this morning.

The Law automobile was stolen on August 7 and on August 12, after a search over the entire northwest, the Grand Forks county officials located the machine in an orchard on the Herman Scheel farm, eight miles from Thompson.

According to Mr. Scheel, Bentz left the machine at his place and declared that he would return for it in the near future. Clues were obtained by the officials which placed them on the track of the thief and he was traced to the Twin Cities, where for several days he remained in hiding.

Every avenue of escape was practically cut off, but Bentz succeeded in making his way west. The officials at Tacoma were notified by Sheriff Turner. He was arrested Saturday.
