TWO CARS IN BAD MIX-UP AT MAX

Both Machines Turn to Same Side of Road and Come Together.

Max, N. D., Sept. 13.—What might have been a very serious accident occurred on Third avenue just north of Main street, C. O. Rostrom, who was driving from the house in a big car, was coming up the hill at a good speed when Norman Beamish who had A. S. Nicholson and Lauren Nicholson in the car with him turned down the hill, Norman, thinking to avoid the accident, turned to the left while Mr. Rostrom, as soon as he saw the other car, instinctively turned to the right with the result that the two cars came together with a crash. Mr. Nicholson, Lauren and Norman escaping without a scratch. Mr. Nicholson received quite a bad cut on the head and injured his chest, but on a doctor repaired the injuries and he was little the worse for wear. Mr. Rostrom escaped without injury. Both cars were badly wrecked and it will cost a nice sum to have them repaired.

ACCIDENTALLY HURT WHILE HUNTING

Jamestown, N. D., Sept. 13.—L. M. Pooley, salesman for the Salszer Lum-

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ber company, residing at Millerton, was riding in a buggy hunting. He had a double barrel shotgun that was loaded, and in some manner the weapon was discharged, a load of shot passing across his abdomen, injuring flesh and also passing into the hand. He bled profusely and was brought to the hospital where the torn arteries were bound up, and he was treated as promptly as possible. He suffered greatly from the loss of blood. Mr. Pooley is a single man and his home is at McClusky. A number of shot are supposed to have entered the side, and the palm of the hand was badly lacerated.

DEAF SCHOOL BEGINS TODAY

More Pupils Expected to Attend This Year—Faculty Increased by One.

Devils Lake, N. D., Sept. 13.—This week opened the term at the North Dakota school for the deaf. Indications are that there will be an increase in attendance this year, a condition easily forecasted in that the superintendent is usually notified ahead of new pupils preparing to enter. The enrollment last year reached 104 and there will be at least fifteen more this year. In order to assure the safe arrival of the younger pupils, teachers go to the junction points to meet the children. Professor Long goes to Jamestown, Miss Buchanan to Grand Forks, and Professor Sheridan to Fargo.

The faculty this year is the same as last except for the addition of Miss Rebecca Smith, a graduate of a college in Mercersburg, Pa. 2,000 BUSHELS OF GRAIN BURNED

Devils Lake, N. D., Sept. 13.—This year when grain was the price high, and threshing cost away out of sight, the reduction of 2,000 bushels to ashes is no slight matter. Such a loss, however, was suffered by M. Strawhecker and Ed Lam when the granary and barn on the Strawhecker farm leased to Mr. Lam were completely destroyed by fire. The cause of the fire is not positively known, but it is thought that the threshers who slept in the barn while the crew worked on the farm, must have left matches in the hay. The barn was lost, most of the horses being on an adjoining farm. The farm is about five miles southwest of Webster and was recently bought by Mr. Strawhecker from Mr. Vanderbreak of Iowa.
