Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 15.—"Would we go into Mexico in case of war? You bet we would!" That's the spirit of the 150 recruits of the Girls' National Honor Guard, who have just broken camp on the banks of Lake Worth. The girls had their encampment for the purpose of preparing themselves for service in the army in time of war. While taking training as Red Cross nurses they went much further, these energetic Texas girls, many of whom are expert shots and riders. They took long hikes and in a hydro-aeroplane took lessons in air and water flights; they practised all the manual of arms and company and battalion field movements. Not some of them go so far as to say that they are willing to bear arms or fly machines if the government needs them. Lieutenant W. H. Henderson of the United States army was in charge of the camp. The guard's officers were General Virginia Lazenby of Waco and Colonel Kate Lehane of Fort Worth. Companies from each town were headed by girl lieutenants. Misses Lazenby and Lehane organized and prepared the encampment by themselves a large undertaking when tents, cots, provisions and thousands of other details had to be arranged for in advance.
