FOR AND AGAINST ARBITRATION

In the controversy between the railroads and the trainmen, which has been settled temporarily by the yielding of congress to a threat, the employers offered to submit all the matters in dispute to a commission of arbitration, and to abide by the result.

It would be interesting to know on just what theory arbitration, which could not be considered in the railroad controversy, becomes the logical and proper thing in the relations between the street railways and their employees; or in what manner the method of settling a difficulty which is wrong now was to be considered right in another dispute a few days ago.

If the precedents established in the railroad controversy are followed now we should look for the interposition of the New York authorities on the side of the employers. In the former case one side offered to arbitrate, and the other refused. The government thereupon declared that for the sake of peace the other side and the nation must yield to the side which would not arbitrate, and this was done.
