N. DAK. STUBBLEFIELDS BETTER THAN USUAL

South St. Paul, Sept. 19.—J. H. McLean, W. A. Scouthern and T. R. McNally have shipped eleven carloads of Montana sheep to the vicinity of Inkster, N. D., which will be run on the stubble fields in that vicinity for a time before being taken to market. There were 2,500 sheep in the bunch. They had a rather large loss in shipping, losing 90 in transit, due to the fact that the railroad company had not mended the top decks of the cars, making the floors slippery and this piled the sheep up in the ends of the cars whenever they were switched around. This is a very good year to run sheep on the stubble fields, as some of the grain was not cut and some fields were so tangled that the binders could not get it all and the animals ought to put on good weight during the next month or six weeks.
