## NO INQUEST HELD BY COUNTY CORONER

Remains of Dagny Lillquist to be shipped to Dahlen, N. D. for interment—Auntie are Here.

No inquest was held by County Coroner R. B. McLean over the remains of Miss Dagny Lillquist, the 22 year old girl, who committed suicide yesterday morning by asphyxiation at the W. J. Pierce home, where she was employed as domestic. It was the decision of the county coroner, after an investigation, that all evidence pointed to a clear case of suicide. The remains, which have been held at the Norman Undertaking parlors, will be shipped today to Dahlen, N. D., where interment will be made. Two aunts, residing in that village, arrived here yesterday and will accompany the remains to Dahlen.
