HUGHES SPEAKS TO VETERANS

Addresses G. A. R. Members at Dayton—Had Quiet Sunday.

Dayton, Ohio, Sept. 25.—The United States Charles E. Hughes told an audience of civil war veterans today, will not endure unless each generation stands firmly for the dignity of American citizenship and the honor of the flag.

Hughes reiterated his stand for the enforcement of American rights "with regard to lives, property and commerce throughout the world."

Spent Day With Fairbanks. Indianapolis, Sept. 25.—Charles E. Hughes yesterday followed his usual procedure of resting on Sunday. He spent the day at the home of Charles W. Fairbanks, his running mate, slept last night on his private car in the railroad yards, and left early today to open his campaign in Ohio at Dayton.

With Mrs. Hughes and Mr. Fairbanks, the nominee went to church yesterday morning and took a motor ride yesterday afternoon. There was also an informal reception late yesterday at the Fairbanks home, where Mr. Hughes met many of Mr. Fairbanks' close friends and neighbors.

Today's program calls for an all-day stay at Dayton. Mr. Hughes will leave Dayton early Tuesday to continue his trip through Ohio. He expects to be accompanied by Governor Willis. Senator Harding, Myron T. Herrick, James R. Garfield and other party leaders.

Will H. Hayes, Republican state chairman of Indiana, issued a statement last night saying that Mr. Hughes would spend two days campaigning in southern Indiana late in October.

U. S. SOLDIER IS HELD IN MEXICO

Carranza Sergeant Killed—Trooper of Fifth Cavalry Held.

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 25.—The Carranza sergeant of El Valle Chihuahua garrison was shot and killed Friday night by an American trooper of the Fifth cavalry, who is being held a prisoner. According to the report brought to Columbus, N. M., from field headquarters today, the Carranza commander at El Valle refused to surrender the prisoner after General Pershing sent a messenger requesting his release.

According to the report eight members of the Fifth cavalry visited a saloon at El Valle and seventeen Carranza soldiers entered later with side arms. During the drinking, the Mexican sergeant is said to have proposed

a toast to the United States, which was objected to by the Americans. The shooting is reported to have followed.


