SAY BULGARS WEAKEN.

Rumanians Also Avert Morale of Austro-Hungarians Broken.

Bucharest, Sept. 26.—(Dispatch to the London Daily Chronicle).—Along the Danube front the Rumanians have developed a vigorous artillery offensive, the enemy positions being swept by shell fire. Signs are not wanting that the Bulgarian offensive is weakening. Their regiments hurriedly dispatched to the Danube front at the opening of Rumanian hostilities were considerably below full war strength and have been still further depleted by heavy losses in the recent fighting at Dobruja.

The enemy last night made a fresh series of counterattacks on the Dobruja lines, but were easily repulsed with loss. The news from Transylvania is of a most gratifying character. The Rumanians are slowly but surely advancing. They have driven the enemy from difficult mountain positions which in each case were stormed and carried by assault. The morale of the Austro-Hungarians is badly broken.

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MANY CIVILIANS FOUND IN WAR ZONE

Paris, Sept. 26.—British surgeons have treated 15,000 cases and performed 463 operations on civilians that follow war. All the inhabitants of the British zone were vaccinated against typhoid and special hospitals were created for children. A considerable number of civilians wounded by shell fire also require their attention.

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
