## MANY PLANS TO DIVIDE COUNTY

Some Would Cut Morton Into Three Parts and Others Would Make Two.

(Herald Special Service.)

Mandan, N. D., Sept. 27.—Mandan county seat of Morton, biggest county in North Dakota with an area greater than that of the state of Connecticut, sits complacently by while county division campaigns are being launched with great ado, in several districts.

One scheme of division contemplates the creation of a Grant county out of the southwest section of the county, leaving Morton with a territory about the same size as that which it is proposed to take from it.

Another scheme contemplates the cutting of the county into three new counties, leaving Morton in the north-west.

Still another proposed division creates the county of Washington out of the western part of the present county, leaving Morton 27 townships in the east end of the county.

County seat aspirations of various interested towns are responsible for the multitude of division schemes.

And if they all go on the ballot, chances are that Morton will remain the same as it is today—with Mandan still the county seat.

## BIG LYNX FOUND BY KENMARE FARMER

Kenmare, N. D., Sept. 27.—Carl Rasmussen, local farmer, knows the sensation of discovering a real live hungry looking lynx, preparing to spring at his throat, his face, or any other part of his anatomy that might come handy.

Rasmussen, seated on his binder, discovered the lynx in the field of wheat, just a foot or two ahead of the reaper, all set to spring at him. He snatched his whip at the horses, they dashed forward suddenly, and just as the lynx was leaping the ground to attack Rasmussen, its two hind legs were caught in the sickle and cut off. The animal, wounded, fell on the apron of the binder, where it was soon killed by Carl Rasmussen. It was a 40 pound lynx that Rasmussen so narrowly escaped having to fight.

## LIGHTNING STARTS FIRE NEAR MANDAN

Mandan, N. D., Sept. 27.—Lightning started a prairie fire about 100 rods northeast of the John Dawson ranch in Barnes vicinity. Mr. Dawson stated that his son, Ralph, was on horseback just a short distance from where the lightning struck and a few minutes afterward he saw smoke coming from behind a bunch of weeds. Upon investigation he found that the fire had started in some tall dry grass and before it could be put out it burned over considerable ground. Mr. Dawson stated that the storm was a genuine electrical storm in his locality. It struck his fence a little ways from the house but did no damage.
