TWO DIE FROM ILLIO COLITIS

Epidemic of Disease Raging in Flasher District—Over 25 Cases.

Mandan, N. D., Sept. 28.—While Mrs. Walter Hanson left the Mandan hospital to attend the funeral of her six year old son her four year old daughter passed away. These are two deaths resulting from a serious epidemic of ilio colitis which has been raging in the Flasher vicinity for two weeks.

At 10 o'clock Saturday night the two Hanson children were taken violently ill. The six year old boy died at 6 o'clock Sunday morning. The little girl, Elvera, in critical condition was brought to the Mandan hospital, but despite heroic attempts to save her, died at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, while her mother had gone to Flasher to attend the funeral of the son.

Physicians thought at first the children had become victims of ptomaine poisoning, but later diagnosed the case as ilio colitis.

One of the Flasher physicians over long distance phone said: "I am unable to account for the epidemic, other than that it must have been caused by something the persons affected have eaten."

"I have had twenty-five cases of ilio colitis in the past two weeks among the children, but the deaths of the two Hanson children are the only fatalities so far. The epidemic is not confined to the children but to grown persons as well, for there have been at least a dozen adults taken ill with the disease in the past two weeks."

of summer complaint or diarrhoea. Mandan physicians have been consulted in the cases and physicians generally are combining to stamp out the epidemic.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hanson, parents of the two victims of the plague, reside about ten miles north of Flasher. One other child, aged about a year and a half, survives.

The funeral of the Hansons' boy was held Tuesday afternoon and the funeral of the little girl was held today.

BREAKS JAW IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Minot, N. D., Sept. 28.—Mrs. J. M. Risley, who lives about two miles west of this city suffered a broken jaw and a number of severe but not dangerous bruises and her husband was also badly shaken up, having one arm and one leg wrenched, when the steering gear of the car they were driving refused to respond to the efforts of the driver and upset throwing them out.

While Mrs. Risley's injury is a painful one it is not a dangerous one and with proper medical care which she is receiving will soon recover. Details of the accident are not available except that when the steering gear refused to respond to the efforts of the driver, it skidded from the grade and overturned. Mr. Risley, is a very careful driver and this probably accounts for the fact that both were not more seriously injured or probably killed.

MINOT CITY WATER UNSAFE

Minot, N. D., Sept. 28.—Dr. J. R. Pence, city health officer, has given public notice that the city water is unsafe for drinking purposes at this time and probably will be so for a month at least. This is caused by the inadequacy of the filtration plant to purify all the water required for domestic and other purposes. Something like a million gallons daily are now being used.

The city schools are not allowed to use the city water for drinking purposes, as it is unsafe. This eliminates the danger of disease among the pupils.

JACK LOSENS AND MAN IS CRUSHED

Bismarck, N. D., Sept. 28.—A terrible accident occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Swan Carlson, residing six miles southeast of White Rock, when their eldest son, Carl, was crushed to death under an automobile which he was engaged in repairing. The young man was working with his big Overland car in the automobile shed and had jacked up the rear end of the car and removed the wheels. He was lying on his back under the rear axle making some repairs when the jack became loosened throwing the entire weight of the car upon his body.

BURNED DISTRICT IS BEING BUILT UP

NEW GARAGE FOR MINOT PLANNED

Minot, N. D., Sept. 28.—A \$35,000 reinforced concrete garage will be erected by Eby & Young at the corner of First street and Fourth avenue S. W. Plans include all the latest development in garage architecture and conveniences. The structure will front 75 feet on First street and 140 feet on Fourth avenue. The present building plans provide for a full basement and one story with provisions for another story in the future. The basement will be completed this fall but the superstructure will not be built until next spring.

The building will be roof proof throughout. Instead of elevators for transferring cars from one floor to another, there will be elevation drive-ways so constructed that the cars can be driven from the one to the other floor without more trouble than is experienced in driving along an ordinary street. There will be no pillars in the entire structure, the roof being carried by heavy truss work which will leave the entire floor space entirely free of obstructions.

BABY WANDERED FIVE MILES AWAY

Williston, N. D., Sept. 28.—Lost on the prairie over night, and having wandered five miles from the point where she had last been seen, the two-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Hilfstedt, of Livonia, was found last Friday afternoon, after the bloodhounds from the state penitentiary had been pressed into service, and the entire party stirred by the search. The child had been left alone in her buggy by Mr. and Mrs. Hilfstedt, asleep, in the yard of the Livonia postoffice, while her parents went out to pick grapes. When the parents returned shortly afterward, the baby was gone.

WRAPS AND PACKS FOR SHIPMENT

Max, N. D., Sept. 28.—J. I. Porter, one of the largest potato growers in the Berthold district, is preparing to sort, wrap in paper and pack several carloads of potatoes to ship to the western coast and to the north. PLANS COMPLETED FOR CONVENTION

Many Prominent Speakers Will Address Teachers of Three Counties at Grafton.

On Thursday and Friday, October 12 and 13, the Tri-County Educational association will hold the annual meeting at Grafton, according to the plans which have been completed. Teachers from Grand Forks, Walsh and Pembina counties are members of the organization and it is expected that over 200 will be in attendance. The program will open the afternoon of October 12 when several addresses will be given, including a talk by E. J. Taylor, state superintendent of public instruction. N. C. Macdon-

DENMARK POLITICAL SITUATION IS QUIET

Copenhagen, Sept. 27, via London, Sept. 28.—The political situation is clear today. After a joint committee of both houses of parliament had con-

ferred from early morning yesterday until night on the situation, including the sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States the committee met the cabinet and it was settled that the radical cabinet should be increased by three members without portfolio, representing the three other parties—conservative, socialist and left—and that the sale of the islands should be settled by the rigstad and by a plebiscite, after a parliamentary committee had considered the matter for six weeks.

As soon as the committee has finished its work the rigstad will vote on the sale and afterward the plebiscite will be held, even though the rigstad vote is against the sale. In the event the rigstad goes on record as being opposed to the sale of the islands, the result of the plebiscite will be put before the chamber for another vote. It has finally been decided that there will be no general election.
