NO GREAT INCREASE IN CRIMES AGAINST BANKS

Protective Department of American Bankers' Association Presents Its Report.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 28.—Crimes committed against banks represented in the American Bankers' association during the past year have shown no marked increase, according to the annual report of the protective department at the convention of the association here today, and it was further shown that the proportion of the burglaries and similar crimes proved unsuccessful.

For the period from Aug. 1, 1915, to September 1, this year, there was a total of 1,875 arrests and 307 convictions. The report notes that the losses sustained by members in connection with burglaries amounted only to \$1,754, while the loss sustained by non-members amounted to more than \$60,000. Through 25 hold-ups however, there was a loss to members of \$65,921, and through nine sneak thefts a loss of \$26,500. The department now has 4,730 photographs of criminals comprising burglars, hold-up men, sneak thieves, forgers and bogus check operators, with a complete record of each.

A large number of the crimes attempted against banks are due to carelessness on the part of the banks in permitting customers to use funds represented in uncollected checks, according to the report, and it was recommended that this practice be discontinued. Trouble is also caused through the practice of leaving blank checks on the counters, and it was urged that this practice be modified by printing across the face of such checks the words "no cash."

East Grand Forks

Wm. Jennings Bryan Was Close Friend of Clinton Babbitt, Father of Mrs. F. E. Lurton of This City

The visit of William Jennings Bryan to Grand Forks is bound up with a local interest that uncovers some of the past history of this distinguished visitor.

Way back in the years when Bryan was a Congressman from the state of Nebraska, Wisconsin sent a young Congressman to the House by the name of Clinton Babbitt. The two fell in love and became fast friends. They soon rented a room in the same house, and were known in the halls of legislation as mutual supporters of each others measures.

When Mr. Babbitt moved his family to Washington, the two fast friends were almost inseparable, and many visits were made back and forth between the two families. This led to an intimate acquaintance between the distinguished Mr. and Mrs. Babbitt, now Mrs. F. E. Lurton, wife of the Superintendent of Schools of East Grand Forks. It was Mrs. Lurton's father, Clinton Babbitt who originally suggested Bryan for the presidency, and it was to the influence of the Wisconsin man that Bryan has attributed much of his national prominence.

Just as Bryan was coming into national prominence, Mr. and Mrs. Lurton were in Chicago, where Mr. Lurton was attending school. It was at this time that the famous Democratic convention was held in the state of Illinois at Chicago, and Bryan swept the convention off its feet with his incomparable oration on "The Cross of Gold." Mrs. Lurton entertained Mrs. Bryan at that time, and she sat beside her at the convention during the impassioned plea of her husband.

When Bryan learned of the death of his long friend, Babbitt, he sent the following telegram to Mrs. Lurton: "I learn with profound sorrow of the death of my dear friend Clinton Babbitt. Rooming in the same house with him during one Congressional term, I became intimately acquainted with him and the friendship then formed has been a cherished one. He was as sincere, conscientious and courageous a public servant as I ever knew and I mourn his loss."

In a speech at Beloit, Wisconsin, Mr. Bryan said, "Clinton Babbitt was the original Bryan man in the sense that three years before the Chicago Convention, he urged my nomination."

MARMO INJURED BY AUTOMOBILE

Struck Down as He Was Crossing Street at Noon Hour Today.

Severt Marmo, 35 years of age, is in Grand Forks hospital as the result of injuries received when he was struck by an automobile driven by Mrs. J. E. Montague of Crookston. The accident occurred during the noon hour today.

Marmo, according to those who witnessed the accident, became confused when his attention was drawn by a passing street car as he was crossing the street, and failed to see the auto approaching from the other direction. In dodging the car he stepped directly in front of it and was thrown to the ground.

When picked up, he was bleeding profusely at the nose. He was hurried to the office of a local physician by Officer Christ Nelson, who witnessed the accident, where an examination revealed a shattered right arm and a number of bad bruises.

Bystanders agree that no blame whatever attaches to Mrs. Montague, who claims she was driving not over five miles an hour. Mrs. Montague is the wife of a prominent Crookston attorney, and was accompanied by several lady friends. She returned to Crookston this afternoon. The car was not injured beyond the breaking of the glass in the headlight.

Marmo was formerly employed in a local brick yard. He has not been in good health for some time, having undergone an operation about a month ago.

MINORS BARRED FROM POOL HALLS

Young men below the age of 18 years must not frequent poolhalls, according to the ban order announced by Chief of Police Hurst. The order applies to students as well, no matter of what age. Chief Hurst announces that arrests will occur in poolhalls where minors are allowed, whether they play or are merely on-lookers, and that parents who desire to have their minor sons keep out of trouble must see that they obey the ban order.
