THE PROPOSED BOND ISSUE. The voters of Grand Forks are to vote within a few days on whether or not the council shall be authorized to issue \$25,000 worth of bonds for repairs and improvements in the power plant and filter. It is to be regretted that the voters have not some time earlier been placed in possession of the information relating to the plant and the manner in which it is proposed to expend this money which is now being compiled by a commission appointed for that purpose, as the findings reached as a result of that survey will necessarily have an important bearing on the advisability of making some or all of these changes.

Itself and purchasing the power from another concern. If the cost to the city under the present arrangement is less than it would be if the purchase were made outright, then the city should continue to generate its own power. If material savings can be made by the purchase of power, power should be purchased. The voters cannot act intelligently unless they have both sets of figures before them. Inasmuch as the real need for bonds, or for the greater portion of them, depends entirely on this comparative cost, it is unfortunate that the survey has not been completed and its results published earlier, in order that the voters might have time to digest the facts before taking action. It is to be remembered that in the offer made by the Power company there is no question of the city abandoning or relinquishing control of its own plant, or any part of it. The proposal is that the city buy current at a stated price for the operation of its pumps and other machinery, and also current at a definite price for the operation of its lamps. If the offer is accepted the same pumps that are now operated will continue to be operated, and by the regular employees of the city. The power would be purchased instead of being generated in the city's boilers.

would be an application to all state officers of the plan now in operation for the election of judicial and educational officers. The plan advocated by Mr. Frazier is not new. It has found some support in many states, and in California it was submitted to the vote of the people and championed by Governor Johnson. The voters of that state, however, rejected the proposal, and political parties are still recognized in California. In support of the plan it is reasoned that political parties necessarily divide along national lines of cleavage, and that as the issues before the people of a state are separate and distinct from those which confront the nation, the political party does not fit properly into the affairs of a state. It is pointed out, on the other hand, that the organized party is a feature of all representative government, and is usually held to be necessary in order that there may be some entity to formulate general policies and accept responsibility for them. Whichever view we take of the general subject, it is clear that some change is inevitable. Either the political party must become better and more firmly organized or it must disappear as a factor in our political life. The conditions in our own state at the present time cannot continue. We have at present two major political parties, organized along national lines, the affairs of both of which are dominated by a third party, organized into compact form, and acting as a unit, but neither holding nor seeking official recognition as a political party. The futility of the regular party organization under these conditions is too manifest to require argument. Running through a long, narrow pipe does not permanently deform water, as it resumes its natural shape when it gets out. The Oshkosh Northwestern inquires if this country can keep property? It is a big question, but probably we can.
