

# FUNERAL FOR PIONEER TODAY

Aged Resident of Grand Forks County Died Saturday Afternoon.

Ellery C. Arnold, 88, pioneer resident of Grand Forks county, died Saturday afternoon at his home at Larimore, after a lingering illness of long duration. At 2 o'clock this afternoon, funeral services were held at Larimore, under the auspices of the North Star Lodge A. F. and A. M. of which the deceased was a charter member. Surviving relatives are F. F. Arnold, Mrs. E. L. Richter and Miss Emma Arnold, all of Larimore. Mr. Arnold was born in Rhode Island, coming west in 1861 and settling in Houston county, Minn. He served in the civil war with the Fifth Minnesota regiment and came to North Dakota in 1880, being one of the first settlers of the township of Larimore. For 12 years he was postmaster at Larimore.

# J. R. CARLEY BACK FROM BANKERS MEET

Claims Kansas City Gathering of Financiers Was One of Greatest Ever Held.

J. R. Carley, cashier of the First National bank, returned last Saturday evening from Kansas City, where he attended the gathering of the American Bankers' association. Mr. Carley declares that the annual gathering at Kansas City was one of the greatest sessions ever held by the organization. When speaking of the accomplishments of the bankers at the meeting, Mr. Carley said: "One of the results accomplished was to get thoroughly organized to influence legislation. All of the bankers practically agreed that the federal reserve act needed changing, especially the sections that eliminated exchange charges on checks sent away. In some instances, the eliminating of this charge has caused heavy losses. The bankers located outside of the reserve centers, held a separate meeting from that of the American association, at which about 1,000 attended, and it was one of the warmest sessions of the gathering. These bankers severely condemned the federal reserve act in many of its provisions and it passed a resolution calling for many improvements, which was later adopted." Herald Want Ads Bring Results.

# BOYS COME FROM BORDER IN AUTO

Car is Run on Two Wagons and Hauled Across Stream at One Place.

Mandan, N. D., Oct. 2.—Ralph Hanson of Mandan and Corporal I. G. Gimbel of Minot who arrived here with Major J. M. Hanley's automobile tell of a strenuous trip from far Mercedes, Texas. Jim Hanley's car was requisitioned when the First North Dakota infantry left Ft. Lincoln, and when he left Mercedes to return home he intended to drive, but because of the threatened railroad strike and the necessity of being here to hold court, took the train. However Hanson and Gimbel finished the trip. They were 27 days en route and met with considerable hard luck. The journey of 2,482 miles, started out splendidly, for the first six or seven hundred miles of Texas roads were largely paved or splendidly graded. Oklahoma trails proved the Jonahs for the boys. There were only a very few bridges and at one place the car was driven onto two big wagons placed side by side and six horses were used to pull the strange ferry through a stream. The Oklahoma roads were the worst encountered on the trip, although Kansas has nothing to boast of. However with the exception of several broken springs and other minor breaks, the trip was made without accident. The Meridian road from Wichita to Salem, S. D., was as good as a paved street, say the boys. Ralph Hanson was one of the Sergeants of Mandan Company F but was rejected at the final physical inspection at Ft. Lincoln. He went south with the regiment in the hopes of getting by the inspection officers at Mercedes. However he was again rejected and spent the entire summer working at his trade carpentering. He reports all the boys enjoying themselves when he left.

# THIRD BATTALION PATROLS BORDER

Companies M, C, D and E, First N. D. Infantry, Jubilant over Orders.

(By Staff Correspondent.) Mercedes, Tex., Oct. 2.—The Third Battalion, First North Dakota Infantry, is happy today over orders which have been received detailing them to patrol duty on the Rio Grande in this vicinity. The orders include companies M, C, D and E, who will relieve the Second Indiana, now stationed here. One company will be stationed at the Mercedes pumping plant, one at Progress, an abandoned Mexican town on this side of the river, one at the Donna pumping station, and one at Champion store. All are scenes of recent fighting between the United States troops and Mexicans. Carranzistas also are patrolling their own side of the river in this district. A regimental test march of 15 miles to the river and back proved the regiment in fine condition. Battalion tests for each of the three battalions was held a few days ago, with satisfactory results. Nothing so far is known here as to when the North Dakota regiment will leave the border for home, but preparations for a long stay are being made. Orders for patrol duty will go far toward relieving the monotony of camp life, and the boys are jubilant over the prospect of being given a taste of real border work.
