SPRING WHEAT GAIN IN 2 YEARS SHOWN

First and Security National Points to Crop Figures in Business Review.

Minneapolis, Oct. 4.—The spring wheat crop of the United States, produced principally in Minnesota and North Dakota and South Dakota, totaled 513,000,000 bushels in the two years 1915 and 1916.

The average production of 256,000,000 for the two years is 24,000,000 bushels more than the average production for the five year period preceding 1915.

CATTLE RATES ABOUT STEADY

Business of Moderate Volume—No High Grade Steers.

South St. Paul, Oct. 4.—Trading basis for fat cattle yesterday duplicated Monday's in most quarters, the market being regarded as steady by most traders.

Marketing has moderated considerably all around the Western circuit since a week ago and total at nine points yesterday was 61,500 cattle and 6,500 calves and for the two days this week aggregated 166,500 cattle and 18,500 calves against 188,500 cattle and 18,000 calves on Monday and Tuesday of last week.

Packers failed to get more than a dime cut in cost here Monday and much of the material here yesterday sold close to last week's closing terms Monday but came back after more with evident relish yesterday.

Native cows and heifers had clearances again between \$4.75 and \$5.75 in most cases and the lively call which cutters and canners has received this week held the latter grades up so that outlet was better than a week ago and the offerings appeared to do little better than like kinds here at the worst stage of last week's trading.

Butcher and bologna bulls have been selling this week at a great variation from rates ruling the latter half of last week. Outside news has supported these.

Veal calves were cashed on about the same terms as on Monday with top at \$11.25 or a quarter under close last week.

Estimated receipts were 2,800 cattle and 700 calves against 4,181 cattle and 775 calves a week ago and 25,618 cattle and 825 calves a year ago.
