SHERIFF MAKES ANOTHER RAID

John Anderson and John Dokken on Unlicense Charge.

John Anderson, proprietor of a soft drink parlor and John Dokken, partner of Ole Borren, were arrested by Sheriff Kelly of Crookston following a raid made last night on their establishments in East Grand Forks.

An examination of their premises failed to find a Swedish alleged to be spreading a net for a charge of keeping an unlicensed drinking place. This is understood to be their first offense. They were released under temporary bonds of \$200 each, and will be arraigned some time this afternoon.

HIS TEAM STOLEN; LOOKS FOR SWED

Took Team, Wagon, Beer and Greyhound Dog from Hitching Rack—Thompson Accuses Swenson.

Armed with a John Doe warrant for the arrest of a Swede alleged to have stolen a team and wagon belonging to Tom Thompson, the police department of East Grand Forks are spreading a net for his capture.

Custom house officials on the border have been notified, evidence pointed to the fact that the thief had taken to the water. The condition of the roads, it is thought he will have to pass over the border in order to reach his destination.

Thompson, who is a junk dealer living on the Red River east of Manvel, claims he had tied his outfit to a hitching post on the First State bank corner. Upon his return, team, wagon and contents, a greyhound and a case of beer, were missing. He had his suspicions as to the identity of the thief, and swore out a warrant, claiming the sudden disappearance of the Swede and the outfit was not a coincidence.

HENRY HENDRICKSON DEAD OF PNEUMONIA

Son of Sandville Township Widow Succumbs at Columbus, N. M., While on Border Duty.

Henry Hendrickson, the 21-year-old son of Mrs. Paul Hendrickson of Sandville township died Sunday of pneumonia brought on by a malarial attack while on border duty at Columbus, N. M., according to advices received yesterday.

The young man enlisted in Grand Forks in July, and after a period spent in the government training camp was sent to Columbus. When the malarial outbreak occurred several weeks ago he became ill, pneumonia complications finally developing which caused his death.

It is not known when the body, which has been shipped, will arrive, and no funeral arrangements have been made.

Rev. J. M. Persenius of Grand Forks will be in charge of the services, which will be held in Sandville township at the Nyskog church.

JOHNSON ACQUITTED, ROUTLEY BOUND OVER

Andrew Johnson and Roy Routley, farmers residing ten miles northeast of here who were arrested a week ago by Sheriff Kelly of Crookston charged with carrying liquor and cigarettes to minors, were given a preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge Robert Blair yesterday.

The complaint was sworn out by the father of one of the boys, who claimed the lad had been made deathly sick by the liquor.

Routley was bound over in the sum of \$300 to the district court, which convenes at Crookston in January. There was not sufficient evidence to hold Johnson, who was released.

CITY HIGH SCHOOL HAS RAPID GROWTH

That the East Grand Forks high school is enjoying a period of exceptional and rapid growth is indicated by a comparison of the official reports of 1912 and 1916. The five year percentage of increase in departments effected follows:

Number enrolled, 85 per cent; in daily classes, 61 per cent; taking agriculture, 317 per cent; bookkeeping, 14 per cent; English, 80 per cent; German, 17 per cent; home economics, 188 per cent; mathematics, 45 per cent; manual training, 155 per cent; shorthand and typewriting, 175 per cent.

During the same period the outside activities of the school have greatly increased, and cover a wide range of work in athletics, domestic science, agriculture, stock raising and exhibits, home economics, garden and baking clubs, literary societies, manual training, etc., and the various ramifications of the work of these departments. All have added their burden of work for the faculty and multiplied the details to be watched by Superintendent F. E. Lurion, and the superintendent received influence and usefulness to the school.

In 1912 there were ten teachers, including the superintendent, who under the simplest organization then prevailing found time to teach two classes. This he cannot do now. One regular teacher since has been added, and a librarian now cares for the library.

The number of classes has risen from 34 five years ago to 54 a day. The enrollment has increased from 72 to 134, while the actual teaching force has been increased by one, or ten per cent.
