WAGES AND HOURS.

If, instead of passing the Adamson bill as it stands, congress had amended a law in accordance with the original demands of the trainmen providing for an eight-hour day with a premium on all labor done beyond the eight-hour period, the result would have been a real shortening of the working day, provided the business of railroading could have been adjusted to that basis, and provided new men could have been put to work every eight hours.

Booster's Meeting at Commercial Club Last Night—Plant Will Bring Approximately 1,000 People to City—Means Three New Railroads.

A three-day campaign to sell stock in the Northern Packing company, which is to erect a \$500,000 packing plant in this city, will be inaugurated Tuesday morning, when representatives of business men of the city will set forth. For three days, Commercial club committees will sell stock in Grand Forks, and it is hoped to dispose of between \$100,000 and \$150,000 in this city.
