FOUR ALLEGED KIDNAPPERS UNDER ARREST

Oak Creek, Colo., Oct. 7.—With one man dead and four suspects under arrest at Steamboat Springs, Sheriff A. H. Shivington and deputies today are pursuing the half dozen other members of the band, which kidnaped R. M. Perry, manager of the Moffet Coal mine, Wednesday night near here and held him two days for a \$15,000 ransom. Perry late yesterday seized a revolver from one of his abductors, killed the guard and escaped.

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
