CATTLE TRADE BASIS STEADY

Clearance for all Sorts on Par With Thursday's—Run 2,900.

South St. Paul, Oct. 7.—Outlet secured for fat cattle was steady as compared with the preceding days of the week in practically all cases. The side news indicated that trade was progressing elsewhere on an unchanged basis but the Western market map showed only a small general run of stuff. The moderate supply billed here was larger than the run at any other Western market and aggregated at nine points for the day was only about 13,500 cattle and 1,500 calves.

Supplies were deficient in the good to choice offerings and no corn-fed offerings or particularly good rangers were on hand. The native assortment was not alone in the representation as a few Dakota lots of a rather ordinary sort reached the yards.

The steer quota was sold mainly between \$5.00 and \$5.50 but at such figures nothing of really good grade was to be had. The run included considerable plain steer stuff which stocker and feeder buyers passed up and which had little "kill" to attract packer buyers. The latter eventually took over several lots of this stock under a ticked pound.

The trade look generally as compared with a week ago but quotable advance has been confined to the cutter and canner cows and to bulls for the most part. The latter have worked up 10 to 15 cents. Some sellers have had even better success in places.

Cows and heifers of the \$5.00 to \$6.00 class are made up majority of the assortment. It is now less difficult to move the desirable steers up around the latter market than it was a few days ago. The week but premiums of half a dollar or more over that figure have not been frequently earned by grassers in recent days owing to scarcity of top quality offerings.

Veal calves held steady with top at \$11.25 which was established as trade summit Thursday when values sagged a quarter. Live calves between top and bottom quotations exist. Toning up of the market gives reason to expect another big cattle run here next week.

Estimated receipts were 2,100 cattle and 700 calves against 2,484 cattle and 586 calves a week ago and 4,617 cattle and 757 calves a year ago.

Nine markets in five days this week had 255,000 cattle and 24,900 calves against 295,000 and 29,000 calves the same days last week.

Incendiary Fires Cost Two Hundred Million Yearly

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Incendiaries in costing the property owners of the United States \$200,000,000 annually, according to R. W. Schimmel, of Minneapolis, Minn., who addressed the Fire Underwriters' association of the Northwest here today. The attorney of the people, said Mr. Schimmel, which makes it next to impossible to secure the conviction of an incendiary by a jury and the faults of the American laws and courts are responsible.

Insanity Will Be Rossi's Defense In Murder Trial

Wallace, Ida., Oct. 5.—That temporary insanity would be defense in the trial of Herman J. Rossi, former mayor of Wallace and prominent businessman, accused of the murder here last June, of Clarence Dahlquist, was indicated today in the examination of jurors by counsel for Rossi. The trial was begun today in the district court before Judge Woods. Fairly rapid progress in obtaining a jury was made, the tentative jury being passed on by the court after 23 talesmen had been examined. The shooting grew out of Dahlquist's alleged intimacy with Mrs. Rossi.

Dem. Candidate to Have His Private Campaign Committee

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 6.—Because of dissatisfaction over the selection of J. B. Fogarty, of Everett, as chairman of the Democratic state central committee, Governor Ernest Lister, Democratic candidate for reelection, announced today that his campaign would be conducted by a separate committee headed by Hugh C. Todd, former Democratic state chairman. At a recent meeting of the state of Spokane, who was favored by Governor Lister. It was asserted that if the board for six-month committee had not been chosen Zittel would have been chosen.

AGREEMENT MADE—New York, Oct. 6.—Representatives of milk distributing companies handling virtually the entire supply of the city except that dispensed by the Berenson-Field farm and Mutual Modern Dairy companies agreed at a conference late tonight to meet the demands of the Dairyman's league for an increased price at six months' contract, under certain conditions.
